Services centre report shows acceptance

shown that Acton Community Services Centre "is starting to provide this area of Halton with a stronger preventative treatment system than has ever before been available to the area," says the centre's first semi-annual report.

Since Jan. 1 this year, 177 persons have turned to the centre for help and counselling in marriage and family relationships, money management, psychiatric assessment children's aid, addiction problems and other areas as well. the report of ACSC chairman Gail Malthy says.

The centre's small counselling room has been used approximately 120 times by regional and provincial staff, which "suggests potential dollar savings to the regional and provincial facilities budgets, now and in the future," the report notes.

By the end of August the centre had spent \$4,294.92 and had \$3,263.68 left to meet the rest of the year. The centre was funded by a \$4,000 start up grant from Halton Region and a \$3,000 grant from Halton
