Turkey shoot this weekend

Georgetown Anglers and Hunters will hold a Turkey Shoot at the club grounds. This is one mile north of Ballinafad sideroad on the 8th line. The time is 12 noon probably till 5 p.m. and the date is Oct. 16, 1976. I am sure the club will have signs up to direct you to the property and these shoots are always a lot of fun for the outdoorsman and his family.

This is one thing about the fall season that is always enjoyable, the turkey shoots. If you want to be sure of getting one of the huge turkeys given as prizes, then head out to the "pattern board". In other words, find out about your gun patterns, by shooting at a white card or piece of paper set up at 25 yards, and at 30 yards.

Try aiming directly at the target, then put up a fresh sheet, and aim either high or low depending where your first concentration of shot went. In this way you will be able to determine the "pattern" of your particular shotgun. Many things effect the pattern and these include the person shooting, the way it is held and the shot shell, the size of shot and the choke of the barrel.

Duck hunting is still a big activity, and the "northern" ducks are moving in more every day. With the high winds and snow of last weekend, the shooting was hard, but with the right lead and a watchful eye, low on the water, they could be taken. Saturday morning, before the snow came. I put up more grouse than I did the whole of the season last year.



As for squirrels, they are always plentiful and with the liberal bags allowed by the game laws, every hunter should take advantage of this fine eating game animal. Don't get me wrong, I was not hunting grouse last weekend, but duck hunting. At this time, I always take a little time out to "prospect" for grouse. This will help me locate better

Tax break tor amateurs

An item in the Ontario Sporting News should interest some people involved in amateur sports.

It seems that a recent revision of the Ministry of Revenue's policy, regarding the taxation of admissions to amateur sports events, Ed Hillier and Gene Inglis exempts amateur organizations, associations or clubs from charging and paying retail sales tax on the Glassford. price of tickets.

The retail Sales Act does impose a tax on the purchase of admissions to an athletic event where the price exceeds 75 cents. However, where the event is an athletic event in which each participant is an amateur or is a member of an athletic organizaton recognized by the Ministry of Culture and Recreation as being comprised of amateurs. the event is an amateur athletic event and the price of admission to it, is exempt of

retail sales tax. If an event includes participants who are either all professional or both professional and amateur a tax must be charged on the price of admission. In the latter case, a tax rate of 10 per cent is payable where the price of admission is more than 92
