

## Permit values up \$500,000 report shows

Gross value of building permits issued in Halton Hills this year during the period ending Sept. 30 was \$12,747,631. The total is \$573,410 higher than the previous month, a building department report shows.

The largest portion of the increased value comes from eight plans for development of single family dwellings without a plan of subdivision. This accounted for \$335,500. Such dwellings included in this category are those developed in rural areas or on existing lots within urban areas.

Alterations accounted for \$4,735 of the more than half million dollar increase in permit value while the remaining funds came from additions, (\$35,000) institutional (\$49,000), agriculture (\$29,700) swimming pools (\$22,300), and garages and carports (\$17,175).

During the past month, the town building department issued three occupancy permits, six Esquencing entrance permits and 19 plumbing permits.

In addition a special lot levy was collected on a 40-unit townhouse development on Maple Avenue built by builder Al Pilutti, the department

## Drivers cautioned

Is the licence plate on your car or truck about to fall off, especially now that they're changed every three years rather than annually?

Motorists who do so "will save themselves some embarrassment," Schwantz said. Should the plate fall off, the motorist is faced with a fine but a charge is "unlikely" he said.

"We would normally give them a chance," to get new plates. Even so, it costs two dollars to register, he said.

Loose licence plates are also more likely to be stolen by criminals who use the plates during their crimes, Schwantz said.

Imagine a situation where there are two imposters, two priests, one Bishop, the wife of a Reverend who's morals are a parody of St. Mary Magdalene before conversion; a maid who thought perhaps rightly that her employers were "far gone". Add to this confusion a thoroughbred Sergeant of the British Police trying to make out who Rev. Toop was. Doing all this, in a typically bull dog fashion.

This situation is crazy and the cast is to say the least, excellent. Mrs. Penelope Toop played by Sandra Belenkey who (thank heavens did not answer her call to the cloth) put herself under a rigorous program of physical exercise to take the strain of "See How They Run".

Tera Studholme, as Ida, the maid, at 18 gives a prodigious performance.

If you think that she is a cockney girl within the hearing of the Bow Bells, stay after the play and talk to her. She speaks perfect Canadian "English" off stage. This girl is gifted with a rare ear for accents and displays it most brilliantly.

Miss Skillon, one of the parishioners of Rev. Toop, (whoever that is!) - played by Cherry Mathews, portrays the role with characteristic British prudery and the mentality of an old spinster. Being English, she has no problem in bringing out the nuances in such a character.













