GDHS field hockey teams wrap up their seasons

The GDHS Rebelettes field hockey teams, coached by Mrs. Sheena Kewley, wrapped up their 1978 season this past week by taking part in two tournaments.

Both the "A" and "B" teams competed in the Halton County championships, held at Burlington's M.M. Robinson High School, last Wednesday and at the third annual non-championship Schoolgirls Conference tournament, held at Toronto's Sunnybrook Park, over the weekend.

The Schoolgirls Conference tournament is unique, in that it is staged, not to declare an overall champion, but rather, to improve the calibre of field hockey at the school level and also to scout possible candidates for the Ontario team.

The Halton Championship was won by T.A. Blakelock High School of Oakville, with Burlington's M.M. Robinson High School placing second, but the two Georgetown teams played extremely well and finished third and fourth, out of

the 10 competing teams.

The GDHS "A" team beat OTIS 1-0, on a goal by Sue Smarda, to advance to semifinal play but were turned back in this encounter, 3-1, by eventual champion, Blakelock. Beth Kewley scored in the semifinal match.

The Rebelettes "B" team, composed mainly of relatively inexperienced players, exceeded all expectations by tripping up Lord Elgin's "A" team, 2-0, in their initial match. Georgetown goals were scored by Louise Morwick and Kim Willocks. In their second game, they were shutout, 2-0 by M.M. Robinson and thus had to settle for fourth place.

It was reported that over 800 girls took part in the Schoolgirls Conference Tournament and the two Georgetown teams acquitted themselves very well indeed. The "A" team won two games, tied another and lost two, while the "B" squad won one game, tied another and lost three matches.

Mrs. Kewley, was extremely pleased with her teams performances and noted that "They played a good brand of field hockey and for their limited experience of the game, really looked good."

The "A" teams wins came over Brampton Centennial, 2-0 Beth Kewley and Sue Smarda scored the goals and over O'Connor, 2-0, with Sue Smarda scoring both goals. They tied Malvern, 0-0, then lost 1-0 to Pickering and 1-0 to Erindale.

The "B" team defeated McLaughlin High School, 1-0, with Liz Moulden getting the goal and tied North Hastings, 0-0. They were defeated 5-0 by a very experienced and powerful St. Marys team; 2-0 by Peterborough and 1-0 by Middlesex High School.

Several Georgetown players were noted by selectors for the Ontario Trials and if they are extended an invitation, will attend the camp at the end of October.

Raiders swamp Dunnville 'Cats team effort spells difference

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders made it two wins in as many outings, in the early going of OHA Intermediate "A" play, by swamping the Dunnville Mudcats, 11-5, in Georgetown, Friday night.

The Raiders unleashed a barrage of shots at Mudcat netminder, Rich Court and game stats show that he was called upon to handle 52 shots. Court's counterpart in the Raiders nets, Mario MacDonald was tested with 29 drives.

The Georgetowners showed their muscle in the early going and had built up a 4-0 lead, before the Mudcats even hit the scoresheet. The last minute blues, that drive coaches up the walls, afflicted the Raiders, as the Mudcats scored at the 18:42 mark of the opening frame to make the count, 4-1 Georgetown at the end of 20 minutes of play.

The opening 10 minutes of

the middle period saw a flurry of action at both ends as the Raiders scored 3 times, by the 3:17 mark and the Mudcats bent the twine twice to make the score 7-3 at that point. Dunnville roared back to narrow the Raider lead to 7-4, with a goal at the 14:16 mark and that's how things stood at the end of the second period.

Dunnville outshot the Raiders, 13-9 in the sandwich frame and this was really the only time in the game, when the visitors came close to matching the efforts of the hometown favourites.

The third period saw the "Red and White" squad turn on the afterburners and the Mudcats were left, gasping for breath.

The Raiders counted four goals, to but one reply from Dunnville and realistically, had the game locked up before

the period's 10 minute mark had been reached.

In the Raiders opening game win, 3-1 over Dundas, Coach Ron Dixon, had expressed concern over the team's conditioning because of a slight third period letdown. Last Friday, the Raiders had more than enough fireworks at the ready, throughout the final 20 minutes of the game and this should stand them in good stead as the season wears on.

Area sportsman passes away

Area sports supporters were saddened by the news that George Rimmer, of Louisville, had passed away last week.

Arena gas fumes, health problem

Leonard Bithel, an engineer with the occupational health protection branch, of the ministry of health, feels that certain arenas in Ontario are unsafe and that they should be equipped with devices to monitor the amount of toxic gases in the air.

The problem centres around the use of gasoline or diesel powered ice-clearing machines and ironically, the problem is most acute in the

newer arenas.

The gasoline-fueled engines, produce toxicants which cause dizziness and nausea when they are allowed to build up. Old arenas, built mostly for old winter use are reported to have natural ventilation, but newer arenas have been made air tight, because of year-round use and herein lies the problem.

Unless the ventilation system in the newer arenas is of top quality, gases are allowed to remain in the building and a health hazard results. The Staff at the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena and the Acton Arena were contacted and both reported there is no problem in the local arenas, even though both use gasoline-powered Zamboni ice-clearing machines.

The Gordon Alcott staff said they had been given a clean bill of health because of a superior ventilating system, while Harold Townsley, Acton arena Manager, felt that fans in the Acton arena adequately handled whatever fumes might be emitted.

Bithel suggested two solutions to the problem: He recommended that arenas purchase electric ice-surfacing machines, thus eliminating toxic fumes or, that could not be done, then suggested the purchase of a monitoring device (costing between \$60 - \$80) that would head off a fume buildup.

Bithel said ministry officials have investigated about 100 arenas, where complaints had been registered and in about half the cases, the level of toxic gases was unacceptable. One inspector found that in one arena there were 275 parts per million of carbon monoxide, the safe level is 35 parts per million.

Jim Day competes again

Olympic action will be recreated at this year's International Fall Equestrian Circuit. The Circuit begins on October 24th to 30th in Washington; from November 2nd to 9th in New York and ends in Toronto, November 12 to 20th, for the Royal Winter Fair.

Teams representing the U.S., Canada, Ireland, and Belgium will be featured as well as individual riders from Australia and Holland. Top riders, including Horby's Jim Day, Jim Elder, John Simpson and Olympic Silver Medalist, Michel Vaillancourt, will be out to make their mark for Canada.

Day, Simpson and team Captain, Ian Miller will be competing at the Washington International Horse Show. Miller, Simpson, Vaillancourt and elder will compete at the show in New York, while the Olympic team of Day Miller and Vaillancourt, under team captain, Elder will compete at the Royal in Toronto.
