Bowling in 1977 Games

The sport of bowling, regarded by many as a strictly social activity, is coming out of the woods and into the athletic spotlight following an announcement last week by the Ontario Bowling Congress.

The OBC has arranged to have bowling included, at both adult and youth levels, in the 1977 Winter Games, scheduled for North Bay, February 11-14.

The OBC will use the Carling O'Keefe rollofs to qualify men's women's and mixed teams, to compete regionally before the Winter Games. The province is divided into six geographic areas and the OBC has separated their 24 zones to fit the six regions.

Each region will qualify teams in the three adult sections. The government will use sponsored regional games in four of the six areas as qualifiers and where regional games are not scheduled, the various bowling associations will conduct their own games to qualify for North Bay.

In youth competition, the Youth Bowling Council (YBC) will use house and zone rounds to qualify bowlers for North Bay, using a doubles format.
