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TO THE RATEPAYERS OF WARD 2

This letter is directed to the voters of Ward 2 where I, W.F. HUNTER, am submitting my name for REGIONAL COUNCILLOR, and elected.

I am not in favour of the proposed new Municipal Building or of incurring any expenses with regard to same during the next two years.

If not already approved, I will strongly oppose the spending of approximately \$70,000.00 on bringing water to the present Town Municipal Building. As a good well with a large supply tank would easily supply the requirements.

You, the taxpayer, should get the independent newspaper of Georgetown, Oct. 13th issue and turn to page 4, "Councillors Attendance Records" wherein they outline the record of each councillor and the amount of meetings he missed. For your information the Councillors are paid for all meetings whether present or absent. Why should we, the taxpayer, be paying for meetings missed by councillors unless they are absent on Council business. My stand in this matter would be that meetings missed by a councillor would be deducted from his salary.

One wonders what the attendance record is at the Regional Level? At the present time at the Regional Council they have a schedule of from four to five meetings a month, mostly afternoon meetings, (approximately 55 meetings a year for each councillor) with a salary of \$8,500.00 per year which, when broken down, is in the area of \$160.00 per meeting whether present or absent, plus car mileage to Regional Building.

An excerpt taken from a local newspaper dated January 30th, this year, headed "Regional Councillors take 10 percent Cut" quote "Oakville Councillor MacLean Anderson said councillors were overpaid and suggested that any notion that regional politics was full time as a 'lot of horseleathers'. He pointed out councillors had five consecutive weeks off at Christmas and more time off in the summer."

A motion was passed that a 10 percent cut be approved and a By Law be prepared but when the By Law was presented it was defeated. The Regional Councillors salaries are set by themselves, and, in my opinion, the salaries should be reduced from \$8,500.00 to \$6,000.00 per year and any missed meetings, other than Regional business, should be deducted. This would save the taxpayer thousands and thousands of dollars and make for better meetings.

The method of the tax structure on farms for the past recent years, I believe is acceptable but the proposed idea that is under discussion at present will be strongly opposed by me if I am in a position to do so.

I have had 13 years experience on Municipal Council.

MTC considers truck bypass

Wallace Street, Acton, may get provincial funds to help turn it into a truck route next year but until the province opens its purse strings, the town's works department will dump loads of gravel to upgrade the road.

More than 100 vehicles daily use Wallace Street, warranting improvement, said Acton merchant Paul Nielsen in a letter signed by many Acton business people to the town's works committee last week.

Coun. Pat McKenzie said in a letter to the committee that Minister of Transport James Snow had hinted provincial funds to construct a proper bypass may be available in 1977 if the town applies as soon as possible.

McKenzie's letter also asked town engineer Robert Austin to report to the next works committee meeting on the engineering of the bypass.

Austin told the committee that engineering, which began last fall, was still uncompleted. He suggested a consulting engineer be hired to complete the plans in time for early construction in 1977.

Dumping gravel on the road would keep it passable except for about a month in the spring, Austin said.

Ice-free winter

The works committee told Glen Williams resident Richard Nowina last week that this winter it will keep free of ice a ditch bordering his property to prevent flooding of his home and garage and contamination of his well.
