The Georgetown Gems, of the Central Ontario Junior "B" League saw action three times last week, but only managed to pick up two points. On Thursday, the Gems lost 7-5, to Dixie, in Dixie's home arena Friday night, the Gems were edged 4-3 by Burlington, in Burlington and on Friday night in what emerged as a typical Streetsville brawl, the Georgetowners posted a well-earned 6-4 win.

The Gems, under Coach Paul Robinson are attempting to work in a system, similar to the ones adopted by the more successful teams at all levels of play, and Robinson frankly admits that it will take some time to work all the bugs out. This was the case against Dixie on Thursday, as the Georgetowners played well, but allowed two costly goals, that spelled the difference, because of a mixup in assignments.

The Georgetowners held a 2-1 lead after the first period, but the score was knotted at 2-2 after forty minutes of play. The game saw-sawed until about the mid-way mark of the third period, when Dixie took control and won 7-5, going

away. Dave Robertson scored twice for the Gems, with singles going to Paul Martin, Charlie Knoepfli and Larry Peterson.

The 4-3 loss to Burlington on Friday night was one that Coach Robinson can easily live with, as he felt his charges played their best game as a unit, in two years. The difference in the game was the outstanding work of Burlington netminder, Rick Katchanowski. He faced 40 drives in recording the win, while Georgetown netminder, Brad Miller was tested on 15 occasions. Mike Richmond, Paul Martin, and Doug Barnes were the Gemini goal-getters.

The game, at home, Saturday night, started out in fine style with both teams sticking to hockey. Then, however, the Gems started to build up a lead, and Streetsville went to the chains, the knives, the clubs etc. a sure trademark of a hush club.

The Gems held a 3-1 lead after the first period, but Streetsville were very much in contention and their play reflected this. The Georgetowners snapped in three goals, before eight minutes had done by in the sandwich frame,

however and then the shenanigans began. Streetsville edged to within three goals after two periods of play and popped in two more in the final period, to make things interesting, but when they blew their cool, in the middle stanza, they also blew the game.

The Gems held on to record the 6-4 win in a game that started out as an entertaining tussle and ended up in the alley. All told, Streetsville racked up 84 penalty minutes while the Gems logged 72 minutes in the "Sin Bin". Two Gems were banished, Charlie Knoepfli received a game misconduct and Tom Fendley received a match misconduct.

On the positive side, six Gems figured in the scoring; Charlie Knoepfli, Mike Richmond, Brent Ransom, Doug Barnes, Ian Syme and Rob Hamilton counted singles. Ransom is the new kid on the block, having arrived in the Gemini cup this past week, and the hunky defenceman has impressed all with his work.

On Friday, the Gems travel to Oakville for a game with the Blades; this Saturday, they host Gerry Ingle's Milton team while the following Tuesday, they play a return match with Streetsville in Streetsville.

## Georgetown in second, Acton in cellar

Streetsville has a tenuous hold on first place in the Central Ontario Junior "B" league, with 15 points, just two ahead of Burlington and Georgetown, who have 13 points and are tied for second place. Dixie heads the second division, with eight points, while Acton with just two points, is mired in the cellar.

Acton, however, pulled off the upset of the season, to date, last Monday night, when they downed Burlington, 8-6, in Burlington.

This next week should be good for both ducks and geese, but I am afraid that it may be all frozen over by this Saturday. That is unless we have a warming trend in the weather, which could make some difference, but I doubt it. The warming trend that is.
