GDMHA fall meeting outlines program

The Georgetown and District Minor Hockey Association held their Fall General Meeting on Sunday, October 17, at the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena Hall and while group President, Joe Pentesco, was quite pleased by the turnout (approximately 50 people were in attendance) he did express regret that a greater number of coaches were not present.

Pentesco reviewed the aims and objectives of the GDMHA, outlined the coaches responsibilities and also pointed out that the parents of the youngsters involved in the hockey program, also have a responsibility to bear. The President noted that parents should ensure that youngsters are outfitted properly and should be transported to their games and practices on time. He also felt, that while friction sometimes develops between players and coaches, much of the problem could be solved if only the parents took the time to get to know the respective

This year's GDMHA registration figures are running very close to those realized last year and while final figures are not yet available, this year's registration is projected to reach 1,030. Last year's registration figure was set at 1,023.

Ice time procedures were reviewed and discussed and it was noted that while the Association is attempting to get more ice time, with the Memorial Arena still under repairs, sacrifices will have to be made. The Tykes are currently splitting the ice and games are being made shorter, at least, until Christmas. Pat Sheehan, Recreation Works Supervisor, attended the meeting and he gave assurances that ice would be available in the Memorial Arena by January 1, 1977.

It was announced that the GDMHA is in sound financial condition and that there would be no public subscription this year.

The GDMHA does have several special functions coming up and they were revealed at the meeting. Jackets will be made available to anyone associated with the GDMHA this year, at a cost of under \$25 and they will be blue, with wide white stripes on the sleeves and of course, bearing the GDMHA crest.

The association will set up a special day, in early November, for ordering the jackets, so that hopefully they will arrive in Georgetown before Christmas.

Mr. Pentesco expressed the group's thanks to the various sponsors, who are supporting the GDMHA and revealed that plans are underway to hold a "Sponsor's Day" sometime in January, so that the sponsor's and the players can get to know one another.

The GDMHA's next meeting, for the election of executive officers is planned for next May.
