## Major Bantams take first loss

Georgetown's DRG Stationary major bantams edged into Dundas on Thursday night to meet a good forechecking squad that was on top of them from the opening whistle. It wasn't until the 31 second mark of the second period that Chuck Moffat, unassisted, put the locals ahead to stay. Rob Ripley made it 2-0, minutes later. Dundas kept coming at Georgetown and only fine goaltending by Brian Bombahl kept them at bay.

Ironically, the only Dundas goal was scored on a mental lapse of Brian's and lost him his shutout. Georgetown hit for two more goals in the third.
