Jim Carpenter and Mark Howie scored unassisted goals while Pat Brauzed scored on passes from Mike Hurley and Mark Howie.

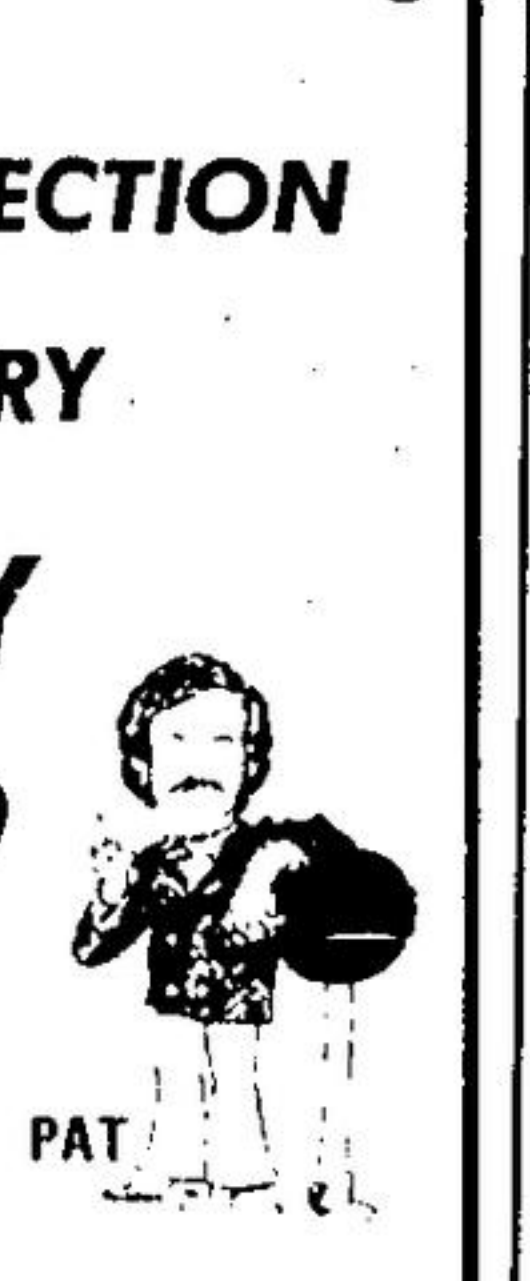
