Senior Rebelettes lose quarter-final

The GDHS Senior girls basketball team ended their 1976 campaign on a rather disappointing note last Wednesday losing 25-14 to Acton, in a game played in Georgetown. The Wednesday game represented the Halton sudden-death quarter-final test and the loss means elimination for the Rebelettes.

The Rebelettes finished the regular season, tied for second place, with Acton and Blakelock. A draw gave second place to the Georgetowners and home court advantage for the quarter-final, while Acton drew to a third place standing. Perdue High School, of Oakville, ended up undisputed

first place. Wednesday's game was more a matter of missed chances, for both teams, rather than one that was decided because of on-court excellence. The Rebelettes made only one-third of their shots from the floor and while Acton was similarly plagued by poor shooting, a fourth period resurgence on their part, spelled the difference in the game.

Rebelette Coach, Mavis O'Neil thought that both teams had "terrible games" and termed the dull, slow contest one worthy of perhaps a "Midget girls basketball" encounter.

The first period ended with

the score tied, 2-2. Remarkably, two further periods of play didn't improve the game's pace, as Georgetown held a marginal 9-8 lead at three-quarter time. The fourth period, however and the turning point in the game, belonged to the Acton hoopsters.

In the fourth period, Acton went into a fast-break offense and took control of the game. They hooped 17 points, to put five for the Rebelettes and the local's saw their playoff and season's hopes rather rapidly frizzle away.

Nancy Phillips scored five points for the Rebelettes; Charlene Milton had four points. Sue Alexander scored three points and Heather Clarke scored two points.

Junior Rebelettes advance to semi-finals

The GDHS Junior Rebelettes, after a rather hectic time of it, in their East Halton League, have advanced to Halton semifinal play as a result of their 47-37 quarter-final win over Perdue High School, in Oakville, on Monday.

The game didn't start out offensive oriented, as Perdue held a slim, 14-13 lead at halftime. According to Reb Coach, Betty Tamas, this was because her charge's press tactics were not working out. Things jelled for the local's however early in the second half and they coasted to the comfortable win.

Claire Galbraith, who is having a fantastic year,

hooped 25 points and snared 18 rebounds. Meredith McLaren was next in the Rebelette scoring parade, she added 12 points.

The Georgetowners travel to Burlington Wednesday (today) for their semifinal match with Lester B. Pearson High School. For the team's supporters, the game will get under way at 7:30 p.m.

Last Friday, the Junior Rebelettes faced Blakelock, in Georgetown, in a replay of a previous week's game, won by the Rebelettes, 25-24. The earlier win should have given the Georgetowners a first place finish in their East Halton League, but a protest and the resultant foggy rulings

caused Friday's replay, which ended, 37-36, in Blakelock's favour.

Prior to the first game Rebelette win, the Blakelock coach had announced that he was playing the game under protest, because he was dissatisfied with some gymnasium apparatus. The protest was thrown out at a meeting of the league's convenors and the Rebelettes were given the win. The Rebelettes expected to play their quarter-final at home last Monday, (November 8) in fact, two game officials arrived in Georgetown for the game, but a last minute meeting of a Board of Referendum washed out the game and decreed that it be replayed.

Friday's game, according to Betty Tamas, Rebelettes Coach, was "the best performance for the team, to date, this year". Although the locals did lose and were shunted to a third place finish in the regular season standings, Betty noted that the girls weren't disconsolate following the defeat and in fact had no reason to be, because they rose to the occasion, gave it all they had and just came up a wee bit short.

There wasn't a five point difference between the two teams, throughout the game. Blakelock led, 10-6 after the first quarter; extended this lead to 26-21 at the half, but then the Rebelettes regrouped and moved in front, by three at three-quarter time. The Georgetowners held on to the lead, but with just 42 seconds left to play, Blakelock had whittled it down to one point, 36-35.

At this point, the GDHS girls went into a stall, they fired, fortunately, a backfired, Blakelock got a steal and a basket, with just 12 seconds remaining in the game and that, as the saying goes, "was all she wrote."

Scoring stats weren't available but Coach Tamas claimed that the scoring was spread evenly throughout the team.

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In the Burlington game, the locals looked great in the opening period, but then Burlington caught fire and grabbed the decision. Greg Muir, from Sandy Watson and Andrew Braun, from Hobbie Duke were the Georgetown gunners.

Against Brampton, the game was scoreless through the first two periods, as defensive play highlighted the game. Then the teams traded goals in the final period. Dave Doucette, who has been playing extremely well lately, on passes from Fred Kendrick and Blake Harrison, scored the Georgetown marker.

Moe expects that the Juniors will play 16 exhibition games prior to the commencement of their regular East Halton schedule with a game in Acton, Monday afternoon. While the locals did pull out a 53-50 win, Leeking spotted flaws that will have to be ramed out.

The Rebs shot only 28 per cent from the floor and showed their inexperience in defensive setups. Moe felt that it was sheer hustle that won the game.

Norm Ituki led the Rebel attack, hooping 19 points, Mike McMenemy was next in line with 15 points. Jamie Hanson deserves special mention for his performance. While he only

The veteran line of Kevin Reeks, Doug Barnes and Charlie Knoepffl received a blast for their inconsistent and at times, confused play.

Georgetown extended their lead to 5-0, about the midway point in the second period and then yawed their way through

the game until the final buzzer sounded. Acton does have problems, talent-wise, but they skated with the Gems through the early part of the opening frame. Even when they were down by a pair, they kept hustling. Then the third Gemini goal, a dribbler, by Mike Richmond, at the 12:51 mark seemed to deflate the whole team. There was a marked change in their attitude, both on the bench and on the ice and they, like the Geminis, at this point, just seemed to want to get the game over with.
