Current Ripples

Some one asked me the other day, what do you have to have to be a lifeguard?

Answer: The department of health set out regulations for swimming pools.

All lifeguards have to be 17 years of age and hold a Royal Life Saving Society Bronze Medalion Award as a minimum qualification.

All of the guards at the Georgetown Indoor Pool have more advanced awards such as Bronze Cross, Award of Merit. Some possess a National Lifeguard Certification.

Most of the guards are also Red Cross Water Safety and Royal Life Saving Society instructors and teach all phases of Aquatics.

A person must enroll in the appropriate class and devote time, physical energy and of course, money to receive and hold these qualifications. In

between these courses there is an on going staff training to keep everyone in peak physical condition.

And the above qualifications have to be kept up to date and renewed every two years which means that the lifeguard instructors has to be in good physical shape and keep abreast of all changes in techniques in guarding and teaching.

There is also a position called, by the D.O.M., "a Safety Assistant." A.S.A. must be 16 years of age and have lifesaving qualifications the same as a lifeguard. But he or she cannot be on the pool deck guarding unless a fully qualified lifeguard is also there at the same time.

So as you see, a lifeguard is not another pretty face sitting in the guard chair. Remember your lifeguard, cares
