

Child hit by truck suffers little injury

Marjorie Grieve, 11, of 10 Tweedie St., Glen Williams, was struck by a town dump truck on the bridge over the Credit River on Main Street, Glen Williams, Nov. 19, police said.

Driver Ronald Latimer, of Limehouse, attempted to avoid the girl who had stepped into his path, police said, but the rear of his vehicle struck her. She was treated for minor injuries at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

MOTORCYCLE

Motorcyclist Richard Vanden Akker, 117 Churchhill Rd., Acton, was treated for minor injuries at hospital after his motorcycle was in collision with two vehicles on Highway 7, north of Willow Park Road, Nov. 16, police said. His motorcycle was completely wrecked.

Police said the cars were driven by Weston motorist Peter Rodrigues and Albert Axford, 12 Baylor Cres. Estimated damages were \$200 to Axford's vehicle and \$100 to Rodrigues'.

WHIPLASH

Acton hydro hearing

During the next several days, arguments against the choice of a corridor route in this area will be presented by Mr. Howitt, whose clients include 22 property owners whose lands would be directly affected by the line, as well as some of the 33 other interested parties.

Despite an objection from Mr. Marshall, Mr. Meyrick ruled that individual presentations by each of the interested parties would also be heard. Their objections to the corridor, he learned, deal largely with the line's possible injurious effects on their lands near Concession 5.

Mr. Marshall explained that the hearings involve land expropriation for the construction of a 14-mile stretch of the 100-mile Bradley-to-Limehouse transmission line. The north-south corridor, he said, would carry 500,000 volts of power from Headley on the Bruce Peninsula to the Milton transformer station. There the line joins with an east-west corridor, forming an inverted "T" formation.

Mr. Marshall said that the Acton inquiry is the second of three such hearings to be held dealing with separate sections of the north-south line.

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Group urges caution over retraining proposal

A proposed agreement between Domtar, its staff association and the International Paperworkers Union came in for criticism Monday because it contains no specific details of retraining or relocation of employees.

Bill Johnson, Save Domtar committee chairman, said there is no mention of "the \$5 million fund for these situations and cautioned the parties to have the documents first studied by a labor law specialist.

NIP labor critic Dr. Ted Bunsall, from Windsor, attended the meeting to discuss the legitimacy of plant closings and circumstances surrounding similar shut-downs across the province.

The committee is concerned that relocation of employees to a similar plant operation in Cornwall will not occur because that plant is reported laying off employees this week.

The committee also expressed dissatisfaction with a duplication in expenses through the use of Canada Manpower while a company-union committee is also functioning.

Mr. Johnson said he is attempting to document all employee transfers, retraining or employment changes to see how successful the crown agency is.

Plow bid

General administration committee (GAC) Monday accepted a bid from Earl Bentley to snowplow town property. Council must also approve the tender.
