

ONTARIO OUTDOORS For ice fishing, know equipment

By Bob Olllvier LOOKS LIKE WE ARE GOING TO GET AN EARLY START TO ICE FISHING THIS YEAR. Now is the time to get your gear together, and see if any of it needs replacing. Also the hooks on your favourite lure might need a little sharpening, or maybe it needs a little paint. How about the line and the rod and line keeper??

If you don't own any ice fishing tackle and only rent it with the rental hut, then I would suggest that you do get some of your own. The main reason being that you can control the type of tackle you will use if it is your own. There is nothing worse than having the wrong items for the fishing conditions that prevail at the time and place where you are at the moment. A good selection is important and not very expensive.

The jigs and plugs that are available are extremely effective especially for lake trout, and white fish that often take the grub type of Jig. For this type of VERTICAL FISHING the RAPALA lures are very good. These are the ones designed for vertical fishing and include, the PILKKI JIGGING LURE. This is available with either treble hooks or a single hook depending on the size of the PILKKI.



Once again I wish to remind ice fishermen and snowmobilers of the regulations and laws governing the trees of our province. IT IS ILLEGAL to cut, mutilate or destroy any tree of any species. Shorelines of lakes and streams and road sides are protected unless by Ministry control. Before someone says it, I realize that survival is an extenuating cicrumstance, but NOT just to keep warm. BANANAS LINSTEAD: Linstead is the name of a local market in Kingston Jamaica. SIX RIPE BANANAS, ONE CUP BROWN SUGAR, TWO TEASPOONS OF LIME or LEMON JUICE, 12 CUP RAISINS, 14 CUP RUM. Sprinkle some of the brown sugar in the bottom of a shallow baking pan, split the bananas lengthwise, lay them in the pan, place the raisins on the fruit and all over the bottom of the pan (thinly). Add lemon juice to rum and pour over everything. Bake in a slow oven (240 degrees) for about an hour. Watch that the brown sugar does not burn and just judge the time for baking. Sleve by pouring the liquid over the fruit.
