Geminis solve Derby riddle post a solid 7-4 win



The Georgetown Sunny Acre Farms Geminis just might have finally solved the riddle of the rough and tumble, Streetsville Derbys. Last Saturday night at the Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, the Gems, except for a second period lapse, outclassed the Derbys in posting a solid 7-4 win.

Gem Coach, Paul Robinson, feels there is only one way to beat the Derbys and Saturdays result seems to bear him out. "They can't take a hit," noted Robinson. "They try to run every team out of the rink with their hitting tactics, but when the tables are turned, they get chippy, retaliate and put themselves out of the game."

This was the strategy for Saturday night's encounter and although Robinson was forced to watch the game from the stands, because of a one game suspension, his charges, under Gemini General Man-

ager, Bob Tost, carried out the plan to perfection.

The Georgetowners went in front by 1-0 count after 20 minutes of play as the visitors stuck to hockey and in fact were assessed only three minor penalties.

In the second period, the Geminis forgot the master plan and instead, played Streetsville's game of taking foolish penalties and the Derbys used this golden opportunity to post four unanswered goals and take a 4-1 lead after two periods.

Tost and team captain, Doug Barnes addressed the local club in the dressing room prior to commencement of play in the third frame and basically what was said, was that the Gems were playing right into Streetsville's hands and losing sight of their own style of play. The talk worked wonders because it was a rejuvenated and

changed Georgetown club that took to the ice for the final 20 minutes of play.

Streetsville were made painfully aware of the turnaround in thinking, when Kevin Heeks narrowed the score to 4-2, on a powerplay goal barely a minute and 24 seconds into play. From here it was just a case of the Derbys folding under pressure, taking stupid penalties, while the Geminis held back, waited for opportunities and cashed in on the opposition's mistakes.

By the 6:02 mark of the third, the Georgetowners had tied the game at 4-4 and Streetsville went completely to pieces. Over the next 14 minutes, Streetsville logged 23 minutes in the "sin bin" and virtually put themselves out of contention.

The winning goal was scored by Larry Peterson, at the 7:56 mark and it was a thing of beauty. The Gem defenceman had committed himself on play and was caught deep in the Streetsville end. The Derby's, in attempting to clear the puck, put it right on Kevin Reek's stick and he in turn relayed it back to Peterson, standing alone in front of the Derby net. With little room to manoeuvre and nowhere to go, Peterson came through

with some slight of hand stick-handling that would have done justice to Kreskin. When he finally buried the puck in the Streetsville net, the Derby goaltender must have been voicing a prayer of thanks as he was so confused, he probably wouldn't have remembered his is own name.

The Geminis added further markers to salt away the win and it was a most satisfying one as it moved the Georgetowners to within three points of the league leading Derbys.

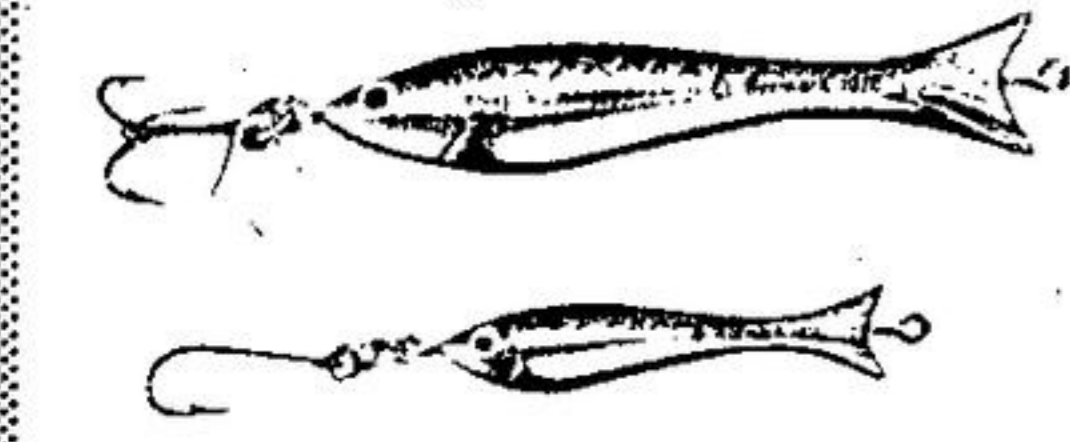

ONTARIO OUTDOORS For ice fishing, know equipment

LOOKS LIKE WE ARE GOING TO GET AN EARLY START TO ICE FISHING THIS YEAR. Now is the time to get your gear together, and see if it needs replacing. Also the hooks on your favourite lure might need a little sharpening, or maybe it needs a little point. How about the line and the rod and line keeper?

If you don't own any ice fishing tackle and only rent it with the rental hut, then I would suggest that you get some of your own. The main reason being that you can control the type of tackle you will use if it is your own. There is nothing worse than having the wrong items for the fishing conditions that prevail at the time and place where you are at the moment. A good selection is important and not very expensive.

The jigs and plugs that are available are extremely effective especially for lake trout, and white fish that often take the grub type of jig. For this type of VERTICAL FISHING the RAPALA lures are very good. These are the ones designed for vertical fishing and include, the PILKKI JIGGING LURE. This is available with either treble hooks or a single hook depending on the size of the PILKKI.



Once again I wish to remind ice fishermen and snowmobilers of the regulations and laws governing the trees of our province. IT IS ILLEGAL to cut, remove or destroy any tree of any species. Shorelines of lakes and streams and road sides are protected unless by Ministry control. Before someone says it, I realize that survival is an extenuating circumstance, but NOT just to keep warm.

A recipe for Christmas dinner, or just for the love of good food. This one I have given before (last February) but it has been requested again.

BANANAS LINSTREAD: Linstread is the name of a local market in Kingston Jamaica. SIX RIPE BANANAS, ONE CUP BROWN SUGAR, TWO TEASPOONS OF LIME or LEMON JUICE, 1/2 CUP RAISINS, 1/4 CUP RUM. Sprinkle some of the brown sugar in the bottom of a shallow baking pan, split the bananas lengthwise, lay them in the pan, place the raisins on the fruit and all over the bottom of the pan (thinly). Add lemon juice to rum and pour over everything. Bake in a slow oven (240 degrees) for about an hour. Watch that the brown sugar does not burn and just judge the time for baking. Sieve by pouring the liquid over the fruit.

Al Pilutti Atoms on 18 win streak
