Activities abound in the outdoors

 My sincere apologies for the heading on last week's column. I never use the shortened term "XMAS" and this newspaper has a policy to always use "CHRISTMAS". Somebody slipped up, and there has been much concern over its effect.

There are lots of activities for the winter sports enthusiasts, and plenty of reasons for the non-participant to get involved.

I am not a "think snow, help stamp out summer" advocate. I think that is about the dumbest thing I have ever heard, but I do take advantage of all our changing seasons.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority is opening its Terra Cotta Conservation Area once again to cross country skiing and snow shoeing this winter, and the programs they prepare are well worth taking advantage of.

The Metro Region Conservation Authority at Albion Hills will have cross country and downhill skiing as well as snow shoeing.

The collection of Lake Trout eggs was considered successful on Lake Simcoe this fall. Almost 300,000 eggs were obtained and will be reared in a Provincial hatchery at Warton. Environmental stress has caused a faltering of natural reproduction and by controlling conditions under which the eggs will grow the unsatisfactory conditions that retard growth and production will be bypassed.

A note from J. Sellers, District Manager of the Ministry of Natural Resources in Sault Ste. Marie says there is great danger to the Lake Trout population there, due to increased access and pressure from winter fishing. A proposed season for that area will be Feb. 15 to March 15 and the third Saturday in May to Sept. 30th. This will be discussed at a public meeting in the Sault, on Jan. 28th 1977 at 7:30 p.m.

While talking to Dr. Frank Philbrook MP on the weekend, he confirmed the news that a new GUN CONTROL bill will be introduced to parliament this week. He could not tell me what it contained or its format as this information is secret until presented.

I guess we have to start all over again, fighting for our rights. Whatever Bill goes through, and you can be sure that one will, MUST be for the benefit of ALL or the majority of Canadians.

A very informative map is put out by the Conservation Authorities branch of the Ministry of Natural Resources bearing the title "Conservation Areas in Ontario" and may be obtained from the Above named branch at Room 5501, Whitney Block, Queens Park, Toronto M5A 1W3 Ont. This map shows all the conservation areas in the province, and the facilities and activities available. Using this map, you can choose your activity and then pick the area that can best serve your needs.

It has been my pleasure over the last few years, to use this column to convey to all my readers, my best wishes at this time of the season. This column and its writer, is dedicated to conserving the outdoors and encouraging people to enjoy the great heritage that is our ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
