



THE LINEUP FOR THE TRI-COUNTY ALL-STARS

York-Simcoe claims 7-6 win over Tri-County All-Stars

All-Star games, for the most part, are usually timid affairs with the players on the respective teams content to go through the paces and leave the ice unscathed. This was not the case last Tuesday night (December 28) at the Gordon

Alcott Memorial arena, when All-Star contingents from Tri-County and York-Simcoe Midget ranks clashed.

The game was won by the York-Simcoe All-stars, 7-6, but from the word go it was clear

that the game would be hotly contested by both teams.

The first period ended, with the Tri-County Stars in from, by a 3-2 count, thanks mainly to a pair of Georgetowners, Mike McMenemy and Bob McCandless. Mike drew first blood for the Tri-County, when he scored barely two minutes into play, on a wicked slap-shot from just inside the blue line. Less than three minutes later, McCandless made it 2-0 for the Tri-County, when he converted passes from Chinguacousy's Pat Fung and Georgetown's, Tim Turner.

The York-Simcoe Stars made it 2-1, when Dan Kennedy potted a marker, but then Streetsville's Ross Carkner

opened up a 3-1 lead for the Tri-County, when he clicked off passes from Fung and Turner. With a little over five minutes to play, York-Simcoe got a goal from Mike Egli to make the score, 3-2, Tri-County, and that's how things stood after the first period.

York-Simcoe were quick off the mark in the sandwich frame and before five minutes had gone by, they hit the scoresheet twice, to move in front, 4-3 for the first time in the game. Blair Lewis and Al Fenton, were the York-Simcoe marksmen.

The Tri-County squad got a goal from Georgetown's Blake Emmerson, on passes from Georgetown's Bill Taylor and Paul Gingras, but the York-Simcoe crew got a goal (his second of the game) from Blair Lewis, at the 5:09 mark, to allow them to hold a slim, 5-4 lead after two periods.

Up to this point in the contest, although no quarter had either been asked, or given, the game was a relatively clean

one, with the Tri-County group being assessed only six minutes in penalties through two periods and the York-Simcoe squad having to sit out only 10 minutes in the "Sin Bin."

The third and crucial stanza saw tempers flare, however and through the final period, the Tri-County lads were assessed 26 minutes in penalties, including two fighting and two game misconducts, while the York-Simcoe squad received 16 minutes in penalties.

York-Simcoe got on the scoresheet first, in third, and the goal by Bruce McDonough allowed York-Simcoe to open up a 6-4 lead. With 10:47 left to play, Georgetown's Tim Turner notched an unassisted goal that put the Tri-County Stars back in the thick of things. Try as they may, however, the local favourites just couldn't put the finishing touches on their scoring chances and Bob Holder's goal with a little over three minutes

to play, gave York Simcoe a 7-5 lead.

With 2:08 left to play, Streetsville's Mark Sinclair, on passes from Ancaster's Craig Squires and Georgetown's Mike McMenemy, narrowed the York-Simcoe lead to 7-6, but then time ran out and York-Simcoe, claimed the win. Not, however, before the real shenanigans began.

With 47 seconds left to play, Bob McCandless and Mark Eutenier tangled with York-Simcoe opponents and McCandless received 11 minutes in penalties, including a game misconduct, while Eutenier was assessed, seven minutes in penalties and similarly ejected.

By this time, however, the die had been cast, in York-Simcoe's favor, and their was nothing left but an outburst of frustrations.
