# **ONTARIO OUTDOORS** Ice fishing tips

Lake Simeoe is almost completely frozen over. At last report the bays were good enough to support snowmobiles and the ice fishing season is getting into full

Most fishermen head for the east side of the lake and I must admit that is where I usually go. For those who do not know much about Lake Simcoe, I do have a list of the ice hut operators as well as those on Lake Nippissing, and a phone call or letter to me will get you this information. (25 Carol St., Georgetown or 877-9290). When going ice fishing for the first time remember that if renting a fish hut from a commercial operator, they (as a rule) supply all tackle and either salted minnows or the live minnows and sometimes both.

Don't be ashamed to say that you are a novice as they are there to help you and meet newcomers to the sport almost every day. They do get busy and a reservation is sometimes necessary.

The new fishing regulations will be ready for distributions in mid-January and till that time a check on last years will sometimes suffice. A more accurate check would be with the ministry of natural resources.

I have, and will continue to try, to keep you updated through the medium of the column.

It is not necessary to travel all the way up to the northern lakes for ice fishing and next week I will be reporting on local conditions. This mainly being private or public fishing clubs. One of these is the one I reported on last spring, the HALTON HILLS TROUT CLUB, which is open to the public for membership.

For those of you who like the breed of dog known as the HUSKIE then head out to Cold Creek Conservation area near Bolton. There are Husky Team Trials on seven different days between now and March 6. For further information call me or phone 661-6600 ext. 235.
