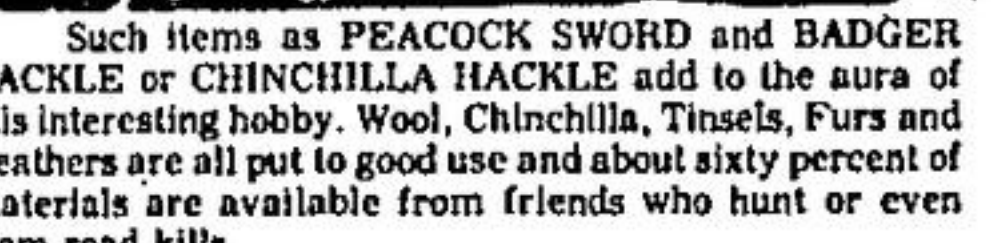
# ONTARIO OUTDOORS

This one for the fisherman who does not wish to go out in the cold weather. Or, anyone with a half hour free from time to time. Or, someone who wishes to turn spare time into cash. FLY TYING: I recently spent an evening with Bob Raynard who owns and operates THE FLY BOX in Bramalea.

I was somewhat taken aback by the vast quantities of material that Bob keeps on hand for his many customers, some of which are commercial fly tyers. I counted thirty different kinds and sizes of hooks, including a number 20 which is so small you can hardly hold it. Some of the tools of the trade, or hobby if you wish, that are sold through the FLY BOX are vases for holding the hooks.

This is a must, although some hold the hook in the fingers. A good pair of scissors is essential, and "hucky pliers" are a handy item along with thread bobbin holders. Several books have been published on fly tying and of these Bob Raynard recommends FLIES, by J. EDSON LEONARD and this book lists 2200 fly patterns. The preferred choice according to Bob should be "THE COMPLETE FLY TYER" by R. CROSS.

For the expert that gets into some trouble or the beginner that needs help in understanding the methods, then "FLY TYING PROBLEMS" by VENIARD and DOWNS will solve these and sells at \$4.50. THE FLY BOX sells all three as well as others.



Such items as PEACOCK SWORD and BADGER HACKLE or CHINCHILLA HACKLE add to the aura of this interesting hobby. Wool, Chinchilla, Tinsels, Furs and Feathers are all put to good use and about sixty percent of materials are available from friends who hunt or even from road kills.

To get into this absorbing hobby, an even \$50 should get you all you need including vise, thread holder, hooks, a good book on the subject with hackle pliers and dubbing needle as options. A catalogue is available free by writing to THE FLY BOX, 34 BEDFORD CRES., BRAMALEA, ONTARIO, or phoning 457-1275. Don't forget the ONTARIO FEDERATION OF ANGLERS AND HUNTERS annual convention to be held at the INN ON THE PARK, TORONTO Feb. 17 to 20th, 1977. This is the 49th annual and ook to be an especially good one.

At least try to get there for part of it, the program includes social as well as business with a dance and banquet. Friday social and dance \$5. per person and the Saturday banquet and dance \$15. per person. But, registration for two including above is \$40 and for single is \$34. This does not include the hotel rooms. This is no "CABIN FOR TWO" but—

OFSSA champ Rick Rodgers looked strong to place first at 106 lbs. Dean Scallan placed 4th in this tough weightclass. At 115 lbs. Pete Fournier and Brian Pendergast placed 4th and 3rd respectively. Both wrestled well in a weightclass that contained Canadian Champion George Gonowal.

At 125 lbs. Phil Milne had a tough day and placed 4th. In a large weightclass at 130 lbs. Ted Phillips, returning from an injured elbow, placed 5th. Behind him Steve Robbins placed 21st. At 136 lbs. John Wright wrestled well to place 7th.

Steve Cropper, at 141 lbs. met stiff competition and placed 7th. At 168 lbs. Brent Collier placed 7th in a large weightclass. Veteran Steve Turner

went unchallenged for the day, winning the final match 34-5. He captured the gold medal. As a team, Georgetown was first with 152 points, Lakport second with 144 points, Shelby third and only one point behind with 143 points. Winston Churchill fourth with 101 points and J.F. Ross with 101 points.
