Ontario bowlers receive cash

Sporting deadlines

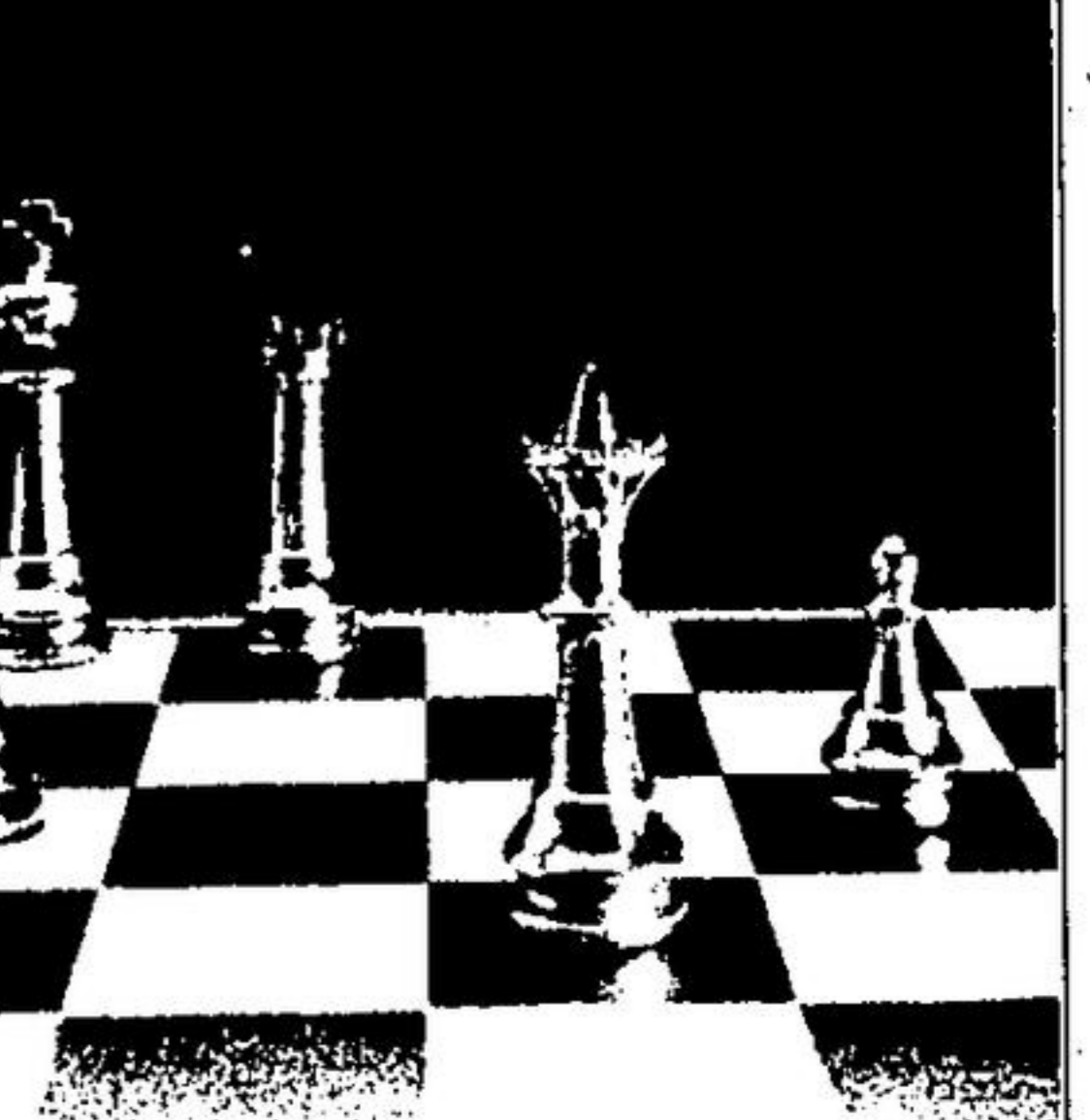

Since election in November the new executive has held several meetings and plans are well underway for the coming season.

Our next General Public meeting is on Feb. 20 at the Alcott Arena Hall from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Players Registration will be held on March 5, 12, and 19.

A coaching clinic is being held on March 5 and 6 under the auspices of the Ontario Soccer Association at a cost of \$5 per person. A further coaching clinic is being held as part of the National Development Coaching Program from March 27 to April 17 on Sundays, at a cost of \$10 per person.

The first clinic will be specifically on soccer and the second clinic will be of a non-specialisation nature and is first stepping stone to a National Coaching Qualification in a particular field.

Those interested should contact a member of the executive for more details and to register. The clinics sound ideal for our purposes and I for one, intend to take part.

A meeting between soccer and recreation department was held a few days ago to discuss some of the current problems at council and it is regrettable that only one member of the department was present. Although the meeting had been arranged towards the end of last year.

The main problem is the timing of the completion of the welcome improvements to the main field at Cedarvale. We have been assured that we will be using the field two weeks after completion, whenever that is likely to be.

In the event that we cannot use the field in time for the official start we have made alternate plans. At this point I do not intend to repeat the whole sad history of the arrangements at council and contractor level. Suffice to say that the course of the problems is at that level.

Some random thoughts in conclusion. Is the number of people who were present at the November meeting indicative of the support for soccer this year? Perhaps we should have the girls represented on the executive - Coaches and managers and referees will be urgently required - and I wonder how many of those who complained last year will give their support by doing something this year instead of running away.
