This week's column will spend some time looking at the purposes of a Recreation & Parks Department and the ensuing benefits to our Community.

In this day of rapid change, people participation, Government cut backs, inflation, high spending, high profits, justifications of goals and objectives, it is no wonder that knowing where you are, where you are going, how you will get there, who can help, and what road blocks you might run into, is vital to success.

With this situation in mind, then your staff has met both formally and informally over the past year or so with a variety of Community groups, members of Council and others to discuss, clarify and reach some consensus on what your recreation & Parks Department's roles and purposes were should be.

This column does not permit enough space to go into any amount of detail; however, generally speaking the purpose that was identified can be stated as follows:

To assure adequate opportunity for every person to engage in satisfying and constructive activities for the benefit of the individual and the total Community through:

1. PROVIDING and assisting in the provision of effective leadership, facilities, activities and information, to enable each person to enjoy meaningful leisure.
2. PROVIDING recreation services that will make everyday life more enjoyable, and that will assist people to develop a feeling of pride in their Community.
3. ENCOURAGING other Agencies and Groups to provide recreation services.
4. FUNCTIONING with total awareness of recreation opportunities and services thus providing Community guidance from the Department services.
5. ASSISTING the total Community to be cognizant of services available and encouraging their pursuit of recreation activities to enhance their way of life.
6. INVOLVING the Community in the development of recreation services.
7. ESTABLISHING and maintaining a good rapport with Community Groups.

The Recreation & Parks Department, on behalf of the Community, are continuing their efforts to wrestle with the obstacles before us in accomplishing our objectives and satisfying our purposes.

Former hydro head dies suddenly

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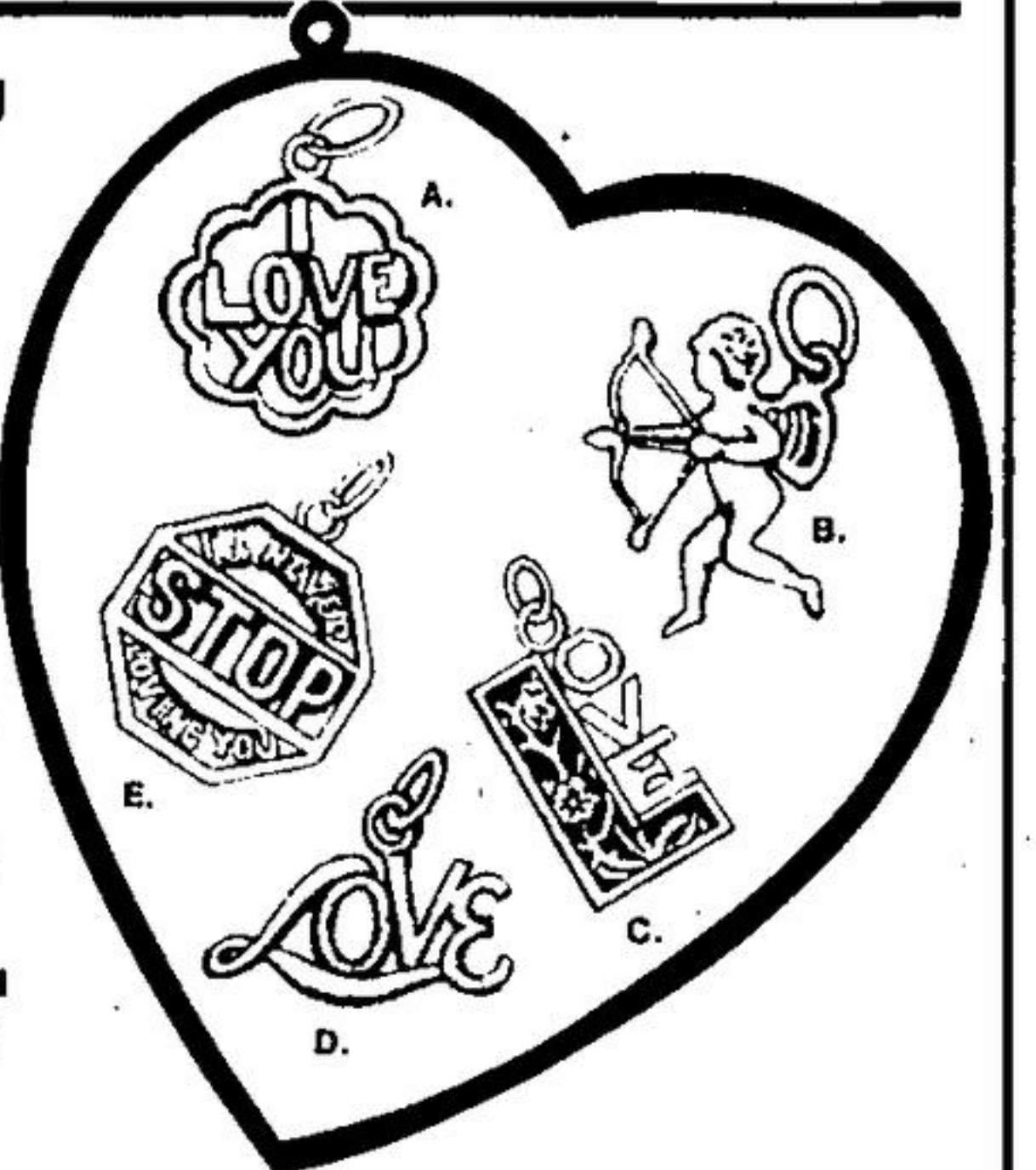
