Disabled athletes seek your support

I received a request last week for some editorial aid from the Ontario Amputee Sports Association. Their endeavours strike a very responsive chord in me, as my older sister, Mary, has been confined to a wheel chair since she was 16.

The Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled will be held in Brantford, from June 17th to June 20 this year and the Association is currently in the process of setting up the organizing of the event. For 1977 there will be multi-disabled Games for paraplegic, blind and amputee competitors and it is hoped that they will gain widespread support.

The Ontario Amputee Sports Association is a new organization formed, among their other aims and objectives, to promote competition amongst amputees. 1977 will be the third year of competition for the group. In 1975, 11 amputees took part in the Games staged in Cambridge and in 1976, 28 amputee athletes competed in London. The organization points out, however, that in their estimation, the province was not truly represented as with the exception of three athletes, the competitors were from Toronto and points east and west.

The Group contends that there must be a vast untapped potential of athletes in South-Western Ontario and they are endeavouring to enlist their support.

In the Olympiad for the Disabled, last summer, Ontario athletes won seven (including three Gold) of the 17 medals awarded to Canadian Amputees.

Competition, it should be stressed, is between similar disabilities, i.e.: a below knee amputee only competes against another below knee amputee. Only by participating in the Ontario Games can an individual be chosen for the Ontario team to go to Edmonton for the Canada Games for the Physically Disabled.

The events for competition will be chosen from, Track: 100 metre run, 1500 metre run, Field: Discus, Football (accuracy) Football (distance), High Jump, Javelin, Long Jump and Shot Putt. Swimming: Freestyle, Breaststroke, Backstroke, Butterfly and Individual Medley. Table Tennis, Lawn Bowling and Rifle shooting will also be on the individual agenda. The team events include, Track: 100 metre relay; Swimming: Medley Relay and Volleyball.

The number of events that a participant may compete in has not yet been decided and replies to the questionnaire (below) will help the association. The questionnaire is not an entry form, or a registration form, merely something to provide needed information to the association. Registration forms and more detailed information will be sent to those persons expressing a desire to participate.

The Ontario Amputee Sports Association is asking for assistance from the public, to provide names and addresses of amputees who may be interested in participation in the Games.

I know from family experience, that just such a venture provides an inestimable service to a disabled person. The boosting of morale, the regaining of pride and the sense of accomplishment; these things that are derived from active participation in something, anything, go a long way in helping the disabled once more take up the gauntlet of life.
