## Geminis end season with 7-4 victory

The Georgetown Sunny Acre Farms Geminis, of the Central Ontario Junior "B" league, completed their regular season last Wednesday night, at the Memorial Arena, by posting a well-earned, 7-4 win over Brampton.

The victory represented something of a turnaround for the local favorites as they had been floundering of late and showing no resemblance to the team that just two months ago, had been challenging for the league lead. The Gems did suffer a slight lapse against Brampton, in the second period, but overall, Coach, Paul Robinson was pleased by the team's performance. Robinson was quick to point out, however, that he credited the showing to a closed-door meeting the players had amongst themselves the previous Monday.

"They came to play Wednesday night," Robinson noted. "Their attitude was different than it had been for the last little while, they were all fired up."

Although the first period score might not indicate it (1-0 for the Gems after 20 minutes of play) the Georgetowners were definitely in command of the game, at this point. They pelted Brampton netminder, Dave Telley, with 19 shots, while limiting Brampton to but eight drives on their own net.

The Georgetown domination continued in the early part of

the sandwich frame and by the 3-17 mark, the Geminis had opened up a 4-0 lead. Then, perhaps because of the lead, the locals allowed Brampton to recover and by the 12:24 mark of the second, Brampton had rallied to tie the game, 4-4.

Lapses like this had been the constant bane of the Gems in their slump, but the new attitude displayed earlier, once more came to the fore as the Juniors shrugged off adversity and initiated a rally of their own.

In the space of the last five minutes of the second period, the Geminis potted two markers and held a 6-4 lead after 40 minutes of play. The final crushing blow to Brampton's hopes, was added barely four minutes into the final stanza, when the Georgetowners netted what proved to be the games final goal.

Although he failed to take any credit for the win, two changes, instituted by Robinson, reaped ample dividends. The Gem Coach, made some line changes, uniting, Doug Barnes with Terry Turner and Charlie Knoepfl and this new trioka picked up six points. Another line change saw Chris Milne centre Paul Martin and Ian Syme and this unit also produced a six point effort. Paul also felt that goaltender, Rick Tomkinson had a fine game and noted that 16 of the

32 shots he faced were of the difficult variety.

Ian Syme netted two goals, for the Gems, while single markers were picked up by Larry Peterson, Marty Kendall, Charlie Knoepfl, Bill McGilloway and Doug Barnes.

## Swim team needs support

The swim team is in the news again. This time they are asking for your help. Sunday, February the 20th from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. has been set aside for a swimathon or whatever you like to call it.

The second thing the swimmer has to do is swim X number of lengths in the two

hour time slot allotted. No swimmer will swim more than 100 lengths.

What are racing lanes? They are the plastic floats that are strung on a cable and run from one end of the pool to the other. They have a number of functions, one is to separate the swimmers from one another so that they will not interfere with swimmers next to them.

Another function is to tell the swimmer how far they are away from the end of the pool, this is indicated by a solid colour a number of feet from the end of the pool, the space in between is made up of two alternating colours.

Last but not least, is the most important function. That is to break up the waves so that each swimmer is swimming in smooth water, which in turn makes for faster swim times. As you can see, racing lanes are an essential part of a swim team's equipment. So if a swim team member approaches you please sponsor them.

## Spring might be in the air

The C.V.C. AUTHORITY is booking schools for the Maple Syrup season which starts March 8. You may wonder what this has to do with the general theme of this column. Personally I think it is one of many signs of spring that are showing recently. On Saturday Feb. 12, my daughter, Maureen, sighted a flock of about eight crows, and on Sunday I saw three flying low over my home. Someone reported seeing a Robin (he called it "the first") a week ago. Personally I think the newspapers should not waste time and space reporting these "sightings". A single bird is not to be taken as an indication of their return, as there are always Robins and Crows around all winter.

The ratio is approximately one pair of Robins (as well as Crows) per ten square mile area. This is based on my own observations and so far has proved to be trustworthy. However, the sighting of so many Crows does give rise to speculation.

Ice fishing is exceptional on Lake Simcoe this year, as long as you don't look for Whitefish in quantity. Lake Trout in the 2-5 pound range are "coming up" frequently, and it is felt that the Ministry's stocking program is bearing fruit. At the rate of non-return of these fish they will not be self-reproducing and it will have to be a "PUT-AND-TAKE" type of fishery. Once again I feel there should be a mandatory fishing license in order to sustain this type of fishery, and the cash flow from this license should not be in the "UNIFIED BUDGET" that the Government is using. In this way the money received will go directly to the providing of recreation for those who pay for it. Mull that one around in your head for awhile!!



Hunting season for Rabbit and Hares closes on the 28th of February in the majority or Ontario, so better get out and take advantage of a better than average season. A long awaited guide to the valuing of guns is now on the market. D.B.I. BOOKS INC. has published MODERN GUN VALUES, and covers the years from 1925 to 1974.
