For sale: redundant schools

Halton board of education has put four schools and five school sites up for sale.

Net revenue for the schools will be placed in a reserve fund for buying other fixed assets.

Mr. Lindley recommended that local municipalities get a 70 per cent discount but the board turned down this proposal in favor of a negotiated discount.

The schools for sale are: -Chapel Street school, Georgetown, on 2.5 acres. The 14,300 square foot school has two floors, 10 classrooms, one kindergarten.

-Centriller public school in Oakville on 2.25 acres. It is two stories brick school with a basement. There are eight classrooms and one ancillary area for a total of 14,000 square feet.

-Glenwood public school, Burlington, on 7.8 acres. The one storey brick veneer structure has 22,653 square feet. There are 11 classrooms, two kindergartens, one general purpose room, one library resource centre and an ancillary area.

Woodview public school, Burlington, on five acres. The one storey brick veneer school has 11,723 square feet, six classrooms, one general purpose room and an ancillary area.

Three of the properties for sale are in Oakville and two are in Burlington.

Greenhouse not needed for some orchid species

Sunny, year-round warm temperatures and hot-house conditions are not necessary for the growth of all types of orchids.

Carrie Caswell, member of the Southern Ontario Orchid Society, told the Georgetown Horticultural Society last Wednesday that some species of orchids can be grown in window sills or with the aid of Grow-Lux lights.

Mrs. Caswell now grows her orchids in a green house but for many years she used a sun porch with good results.

"I was bitten by the 'orchiditis bug' and have been growing orchids ever since," Mrs. Caswell explained. Interested members of the horticultural society were invited to visit her greenhouse and see all of the different species that she has growing there.

Mrs. Caswell brought many different types of orchids with her to the meeting and told the group how to make corsages and arrange orchids with other dried flowers to make pleasing arrangements.

The Southern Ontario Orchid Society, which Mrs. Caswell has belonged to for 12 years, tries to develop new and more exotic varieties of orchids.

Regional chairman Ric Morrow and public works committee chairman Coun. Jack Itafits urged all new members of council to review the information on various studies, including the development potential of a resource recycling operation, prior to attending the meeting.

Jazz film presented

Jazz buffs are in for a treat. Halton Hills Public Library has arranged for Joe Showler, one of the 10 or so "major" jazz film collectors in the world, to bring part of his collection to Georgetown for your enjoyment.

Mr. Showler has selected one and a half hours of clips and shorts featuring the likes of Duke Ellington, Satchmo, Count Basie, Fats Waller, Jack Teagarden and Benny Goodman. Some of these films are rare visual records of fabulous performers now dead and lost to modern audiences.

Mr. Showler, a Toronto shipping clerk, got hooked on jazz when his father suggested he buy a Jack Teagarden recording. Teagarden was already dead, but Joe felt an urge to see Teagarden perform in person. The only way was by finding films. While searching for Teagarden films, Showler met other serious collectors, and this led to the accumulation of other rare films.

The viewing is at Knox Church Hall, Main Street Georgetown, on March 3. Admission is free.
