The special regional committee studying the effects of the services in Halton Region since regionalization in 1974 will meet for the first time this year Feb. 24. The meeting will be held at regional headquarters Burlington and will include staff, regional council members and staff from the four area municipalities.

MacArthur on NEC

Former Milton mayor Anne MacArthur has been appointed a member-at-large of the Ningara Escarpment Commission. The appointment was announced to regional council last week in the form of a letter from Donald Irvine, provincial secretary for resources development, who also sought three names of proposed regional council appointees for the single regional vacancy. Council suggested Milton Coun. Jim Watson, Halton Hills Coun. Roy Booth and Burlington Coun. Vern Connell for the \$65a-day appointment. Council approved the suggested names following Burlington Mayor Mary Munro's expressed concern over parochialism. Oakville Coun. Ron Planche lightheartedly suggested the easiest way of overcoming the problem would be to nominate two Liberals and a Progressive Conservative for the post. He said that while he would consider accepting such an appointment, there is little point in his name being submitted. He said following the meeting he made the comment because he is Liberal.

The loose fitting, tuniclength jacket has two removable inner linings and would replace the fitted tunic for general patrol work

Should the commission decide to outfit the police with the jacket, the fitted tunic would be reserved for special

Police-. Chief Kenneth Skerrett told the commission three officers had worn the tacket and made a favorable report. To outfit the entire force in one year with the tackets would cost between \$16,000 to \$18,000, he said Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett, who noted that the sample jacket was made in Boston, said it makes a policeman look "like a post-

Wearing it, a policeman "doesn't even look like a policeman." he said.


