Twelve school pupils learn pottery-making

Val Cassie, a member of the Credit Valley Artisans, is teaching 12 public school children the fundamentals of pottery. In the previous lessons, she taught them basic techniques, and last week the pupils combined these altogether, creating mushrooms, bells, cups and saucers and vases.

The three techniques used are: pinch-pot, slab and coil. Most of the potters found pinch-pot the easiest for it is achieved by rolling the clay in a ball and pinching the sides at the top.

Covering a jar with paper, then putting clay around the jar forms slabs. Coils are formed by rolling the clay and pushing it together.

"The children are really 'gung-ho' and enthusiastic. They are fun to teach," she said. "The children used their own ideas for their projects. The only problem is they tend to mass produce."

The adult pottery class will fill the kiln with one load, while the children fill it with two loads. Firing or glazing the pottery in the kiln is a three-day procedure.

The clay articles the children finished this week, will be fired by a member of the Artisans, Ranjit Iteel, before next Saturday. The children will glaze their pots by brushing on a glaze in the next class. Following the glazing the pots need to be fired again. Each child will be taking about five articles home.

There are different recipes for different colored glazes, but depending on the position the pot is placed in the kiln the glaze will turn out different every time. The heat varies inside the kiln.

All the children were excited when their parents came to pick them up, and the parents received a grand tour of the workshop. They were proud of their work, and as Mrs. Cassie said they weren't afraid to make mistakes. Sometimes in adult classes, people are worried of ridicule and feel inhibited.
