Second Rebel tourney attracts class teams

The second Annual Rebel Junior Invitational Basketball Tournament, staged last Saturday at the GDHS gymnasium, was definitely not the high point of the year for the Junior Rebel contingent, but it did feature a high calibre of play and prompted Rebel Coach, Morley Leeking to comment, "The excellence of the teams that took part in this year's tournament just shows the unbelievable improvement in high school Junior basketball program over the last several years."

Martingrove, a team from Toronto, won the tournament championship, setting down Grimshy, 45-39.

The Junior Rebs, a young team that has had it's prob-

lems, were eliminated after two games. In their opening contest, the Rebs lost, 66-44, to eventual Champion, Martingrove, but showed promise by staying with the talented Martingrove squad, through a good portion of the game. Martingrove were in front by just five, 28-23 at the half, then gradually took control of the game. Scott Reis hit for 10 points in this game, with Norm Bulki adding nine points.

This loss shunted the Rebels to the Consolation side and in a semifinal match, the locals lost 53-45 to Dundas. This was not one of the Rebs better showings and the team knew it. In their season ending points, Jamie Hansen and Scott Reis scored six points apiece and Todd Derek

and Nick Fisher chipped in with four points each.

Earlier games saw Queen Elizabeth Park down Dundas, 55-46, Grimshy top Henry Carr, 59-45 and Markham beat Oakridge 73-64. In the other consolation semifinal Oakridge whipped Henry Carr, 62-43.

In championship semifinal play, Martingrove got by Queen Elizabeth Park 49-45 and Grimshy toppled Markham, 48-39 to set the stage for the championship match.

In the Consolation Final, Oakridge (of London) easily handled Dundas, 64-45.

"All the visiting coaches commented fairly on the tournament," noted Leeking "and the high calibre of teams that we are attracting is getting the tournament excellent recognition."

The Most Valuable Player of the Tournament, was Martingrove's Roy Barrett and this talented youngster amazed spectators with his play, especially his leaping ability. The Consolation Champion, Oakridge, received individual player trophies, donated by Beaver Foods. The Championship trophy was donated by Kirby's Bus Lines and the Martingrove players also received individual trophies, again donated by Kirby's.

Many animals need protection

Charges have been laid under the Game and Fish Act under section 47.1, which states that no person shall sell a Game Animal. The charges arise from the sale of Jack Rabbits at the Stouffville Farmers Market. Just goes to show the regulations are enforced, and people still try to break them.

Eight new species have been placed on the "endangered species list" of Ontario. Four are birds, one is the Lake Erie Island Water Snake, and one is the Eastern Cougar, and a plant, the Small White Ladies Slipper Orchid. The west Virginia White Butterfly, is limited to two locations, one of which is Halton.

The Twelve Species that now constitute the list, are threatened due to loss of habitat and not to hunting as is sometimes purported to be the case. Don't let anyone try to intimidate you as a destroyer of wildlife just because you hunt!!!

I have received my Base map indicating the zones for Moose hunting in Ontario. The chart which accompanied the map shows the areas and the seasons for Moose and I will make it available for those who wish to examine it further and in detail. It is good to see longer seasons for Archery and Primitive weapons this year.

Junior Rebels show promise

Junior Rebel basketball Coach, Morley "Mac" Leeking, expected that the just ended season would serve as a testing ground for his young charges. The Rebs were in the midst of a re-building year and Leeking was willing to accept the brisures as the price his team had to pay to gain much needed competitive experience.

The Exhibition Season ended on a high note for the Junior Rebs as they dumped Dundas Secondary School, 66-44 last Thursday, in Dundas, in an exhibition game and displayed tremendous promise that better things will come their collective way when competition begins next year.

The Rebs controlled play throughout against Dundas and held a 66-44 lead at half time. Throughout the second half, the Rebels continued to play with a vengeance and crushed to the win. Leeking felt that the whole team played up to scratch and felt that a tough aggressive defence and the ability to convert the easy scoring chances, combined to give the team a win. The team shot 44 per cent from the floor and snared an excellent 40 rebounds.

Norm Bulki led the Rebel charge by hooping 21 points, Jamie Hansen netted 14 points, Rick Fisher had a 10 point game and Jeff McNeil, a mid-age player, chipped in with six points, even though he saw limited action.

The Rebs rounded out the year, by competing in the second annual 'Reb' Invitational Tourna nt on Saturday, but were def

early as they drops their first two games. The Georgetowners finished a game out of the playoffs in their East Haldon league, sporting a 4-4 record and overall, recorded a 10-15 season, won't last mark. Nine players will be returning to the Junior ranks next year and with the addition of some promising prospects, who are expected to make the jump from the Midget team, Coach Leeking as well as his players are already chomping at the bit concerning next year's possibilities.
