Centennial Srs win tourney

The Centennial Public School Senior wrestling team capped first place honors at a tournament staged at J.B. Tyrell Senior Public School in Scarborough over the weekend. What made the victory even sweeter for Coach Jim Hall and his charges was that they topped Robert Service Public School, for the first time in three years. Service finished third behind Centennial and Statton Public School.

Over 200 competitors from 14 schools took part in the tourney (over 20 competitors in most weight classes) and Centennial did extremely well. Twenty-five Georgetown wrestlers made the trip and Centennial took two firsts, a second, five thirds, a fourth, two fifths and a sixth.

Mike Taylor, at 70 lbs., and Keith Ledger at 98 lbs., claimed weight-class titles. Bob Dean took second at 150 lbs., while third place finishes

were garnered by Bob Anderson at 70 lbs., Kirk Warnock at 98 lbs., Bob Grasby, at 130 lbs. and Eric Elson at 123 lbs. Chris Malinire was fourth at 83 lbs., David Johnson was fifth at 90 lbs., as was Chris Anderson at 76 lbs., Mike Wroblewski at 76 lbs., placed sixth.

Other Centennial wrestlers who competed, included, Kevin Franks, Ken Werry, Roy Marriotte, Al Domanski, Ron Martin, Todd Cronkite, Kevin Wilcox, Jim McIntyre, John Scott, John Holdahl, Mike Lord, Chris Lysholm and Rod Sparks.

The Centennial Senior team will be competing in a tournament at Robert Service Public School, in Scarborough, this weekend and it is expected that this will represent a high point in the wrestlers' season.
