

PROPOSED ACTON SCHOOL CREST

DELEGATION URGES ACTON SCHOOL NAME

A delegation from Acton appeared before Halton board of education Thursday to urge the board to name the new middle school, which will open in September, the McKenzie-Smith middle school and to show the board a proposed crest for the school

Acton has a tradiction of naming its schools after former educational leaders in the community, Kathy Sanford a teacher at Robert Little school told the board. In this case, Acton wished to honor W.D. Elmer Smith

and Garnet W. "Pat" McKenzle, who both retired in 1973 after a combined total of 82 years, as teachers and principals, she said.

Mr. Smith died four months after retirement but Mr. McKenzie has continued to serve the community as a regional and area councillor for Ward One.

The proposed crest for the school was designed by Kevin Broostad, one of seven local youths who died in a head-on collision on Highway 25, March 6, 1976.

Emerson Lavender, director of education, noted that another point may have to be added to the stylized maple leaf which dominates the crest as it has only nine and the Canadian flag has 10.

The boards policy in naming schools is to either follow a prepared list or follow the wishes of the people in the community, Mr. Lavender said.

Schools are usually named in memory of someone but there was a precedent already established which would allow the school to be named after someone still living, he told the board.

The board will vote on the issue tomorrow (Thursday).

Premier William Davis has been asked to opt out of the federal wage and price controls, reduce provincial sales tax and stimulate the economy not with tax cuts to business but by increased demand from

Premier Davis with Labor Minister Bette Stephenson and Mississauga North MPP Terry Jones met behind closed doors Friday in Malton with officials of Brampton and District Labor Council to hear the re-

Premier Davis told reporters after the meeting that controls should not be part of a long-term policy and that the province had taken the Initiative in a recent conference on how to move out of controls. There is no disagreement about getting out of controls, he said. "The question is how and when the controls are phased

The provincial agreement for wage controls covers only employees in the public sector. He said Provincial Treasurer Darcy McKeough was working on the budget but offered no encouragement that sales

The labor council's brief attacked the three issues the federal government used to implement wages and price controls in October, 1975.

In October, 1975, Canada's rate of inflation was 10.2 per cent compared with 7.6 per cent in the United States, the brief says. In January 1977, Canada's rate of inflation was 8.4 per cent compared with 6.3 per cent for the United States. "Controls are not the main

it did in other countries." The argument of the federal government that controls cent by January 1977. would improve Canada's competitive positon in the world market has resulted in the opposite effect, the brief says. In the year prior to controls,

export prices increased by 6.1 per cent while import prices increased by 5.4 per cent. However, during the first year of controls, export prices increased by 2.9 per cent while import prices increased 1.4 per Buzz Hargrove, internation-

"In addition," the brief says, "If we compare labor costs for various countries for the period 1967 to 1975, with no wage controls, we find that labor costs in countries we trade heavily with such as Germany, Sweden and Japan, rose two to three times as fast as in Canada and in comparison to the United States, our major competitor wages rose at virtually the same rate as in

Canada. "All available statistics show that wage increases whether they occur in Canada, or at a much higher rate among out trading partners, nave little if any effect on our competitive position in the world market," the brief says.

The brief also attacked the federal government's argument that controls would decrease the unemployment

In Ontario the rate of unemployment in October 1975 was 6 per cent and rose to 6.2 per

"Since controls were implemented in October, 1975, there has been in excess of three hundred million dollars taken out of the pay cheques of organized workers and many millions more taken from unorganized workers under the disguise of voluntary compliance by their employers," the

Auto Workers told reporters the labor council was disappointed it did not get a commitment from Premier Davis but that there is some optimism if federal Finance Minister Donald MacDonald removes wage and price controls in the budgel to be brought down March

More meetings are scheduled with politicians to urge them to bring an end to controls Mr. Hargrove said. "We'll continue to push for the end of controls." Without constant pressure from labor, controls may have lasted the full three years as was proposed in October 1975 and "would, perhaps, have been on wages but not prices," he said.
