Raiders win two from Port break slump with a bang

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders rebounded from two previous disappointing outings to thump Port Colborne Sailors twice by identical 8-2 scores in last week's action in OHA Major Intermediate "A" bestof-seven semifinal play. The Raiders, however, couldn't find the same magical formula in Port Colborne Sunday night and they were pummelled, 6-0 by an obviously aroused Sailor crew.




