regional and town planners to understand the intent of the Green Paper and the feelings



Citing a "great inconvenience" to both the merchants and the customers at the plaza, Mr. Robbins told council that confrontations with the operator of the areade had produced no satisfactory results.

Asked by Coun. Pete Pomeroy whether the noise level was his sole complaint. Mr. Robbins added that the arcade's clientele was responsible for some "foul language" which has a damaging effect on businesses such as his own which eater to women.

The police are reluctant to take action where private property is concerned, Mayor Tom Hill added.

"I wonder if we couldn't amend the bylaw to give it some teeth?" Coun. Peter Marks asked. "We likely haven't seen the last of this type of problem and I wouldn't want to just let it die."
