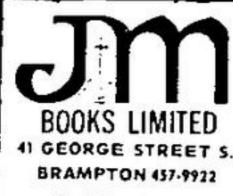

HALTON HILLS RECREATION and PARKS

TENNIS Until the Spring of 1975, only (2) tennis courts existed in the Town of Hallon Hills, to serve a population of better than 32,000. In a period of approximately six months (Spring-Fall, 1975) nine new tennis courts were developed in the Town to better handle the large numbers who were becoming interested in the sport of tennis.

At the present time there are four court locations. Gordon Alcott Tennis Club (4), Acton Tennis Club (3), Joseph Gibbons (2), Emmerson Park (2).

To help monitor tennis in the Town, a Halton Hills Tennis Association was established. The executive consists of two representatives from each of the four member clubs. Meetings are held once a month from February to November. The purpose of this association is to

a) co-ordinate the activities of tennis in the Town. b) encourage inter club competition - by providing and regulating Town Wide Tournaments.

c) provide players and coaches clinics. d) promote a friendly and social atmosphere among

e) provide input and submit recommendations towards the development of tennis facilities in Halton

f) liason with the Town of Halton Hills Recreation and Parks Department and other associated organiza-

Tennis Association and Recreation Department with a liason to the community through the persons listed above. Membership for clubs are being accepted now, Membership forms will be available at the area Recrea-

tion Offices or the various clubs. It should be noted at this time, that each Club is required to atot 25 per cent of court playing time to public use. Therefore it is possible to play without becoming a member Anyone 18 years of age or over who joins a tennis club

in town pays \$1.00 to the Halton Hills Tennis Association. This money is spent to help develop this sport. Last year a very successful tournament was held in August, and it is in the plans of the executive of the Hallon Hills Tennis Association this year, that this fournament will be continued this summer.

NOTES TO 1976 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS NOTE NO. 1 - ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting
The accrual method for reporting revenue and expenditure has been used with the exception of reporting of charges for net long-term liabilities. Principal and interest are not accrued from the due date of payment to the end of the fiscal year. Fleet Arms Fixed assets are charged to current expenditure unless financed by long-term debt. Prin-

cipal and interest charges on net long-term liabilities are included in expenditure in the Fixed Assets, described as capital outlay to be recovered in future years, are included on the Balance Sheet only to the extent of the balances of the related net long-term liabilities outstanding and of the related temporary financing at the end of the fiscal year.

Net long-term liabilities payable in U.S.A. dollars are stated at par value with Canadian dollars. The amount outstanding at December 31, 1976 is \$1,884,100 U.S.

(d) Net Long Term Liebdittes Debentures are recorded as unmatured debenture debt in the year of sale.

NOTE NO. 2 - LIABILITY FOR SICK LEAVE BENEFITS

Under the sick leave benefit plan unused sick leave can accumulate and employees may become entitled to a cash payment when they leave the board's employment. These accumulated days, to the extent that they could be used to determine the cash payment to an employee on terminating, amount to \$43,780. No provision has been made on account of
