Trout season this weekend

 THANKS to the many people that dropped by at North Halton Sports last weekend. It was good to see so many of you again and to make many new friends. The many kind words about this column were appreciated, but it must be remembered that YOU make it what it is.

Thank you for the many invitations to go fishing. If I went with a different person every day, it would take till well into August. Come to think of it, that sounds good to me.

Only a few short days left to get all you need to open the trout season this Saturday. Granted some have been fishing the Rainbow Runs in the Great Lakes and Georgian Bay where the season is already open, but for the majority of fishermen and women this Saturday sees it off properly.

If you are in doubt as to what to use, drop in to see Pete or Judy at North Halton Sports on Main Street in Georgetown or give me a call at 877-9290.

Down to the NITTY GRITTY—where to fish. Following is a list of places where trout are available in the area around Halton Hills. South of Georgetown, MILTON HEIGHTS, KILBRIDE, LOWVILLE, MILTON TOWN POND, CAMPBELLVILLE, BURNS, KELSLO all with Rainbow trout and some species in a few of them. North of Georgetown, Orangeville conservation area, Rainbow Trout; Belfountain conservation area, Brook Trout in the Credit River above the dam; Terra Cotta conservation area, Brook trout in four ponds; the Credit River has Brook trout and Brown trout, although the browns are hard to get.

The old dam in Georgetown should be good with the possibility of some really big Rainbow Trout in the 10-15 pound class. Don't scoff at this. I caught and released one there last fall that weighed 19½ pounds. There is a good chance of them being there now.

The many streams around Georgetown and Acton have good populations of wild trout.

ALTON, ORANGEVILLE and the FORKS OF THE CREDIT will likely be crowded but they always give up some really big trout on opening day. Just remember to adjust your technique to the water condition and go LIGHT, no leaders or large hooks. A number 10 or number 8 short shank is ideal and only use sinkers if absolutely necessary.

Of course, there is the "big" fishing at Collingwood, Owen Sound, Thornbury, Southampton etc.

Wherever you go, whatever you fish for, make sure you obey the fishing laws, keep an eye out for sanctuaries, do not trespass, and enjoy yourself.

Let me know how you do and stop and say "hello" if you see me out trout fishing in the ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

Use anything for rescue

 This is the second of the rescue series, the first one was the reaching assist.

What can you do if your reaching assist will not reach the victim? You must find something to throw to the victim, something that will float.

Let us look at some of the objects you can find around the water front that will float. To start with, the foam cooler with the lunch in, even the metal cooler with the cans of

pop and ice will float and support an adult. Even the gallon jug with the lemonade in will float. The wooden picnic table obviously will float.

The lifejackets from the boat, the boat cushions, cars of paddles, even the spare tire out of your automobile will support five or six adults.

Throw anything and everything out to your victim, fill the water with floating objects.

If the victim is too far out from shore for you to throw the aid to, you must swim out to them and push the aid so that they can grasp it. Then back

off, do not come in contact with them.

After they have hold of the aid, talk to them, convince them that they will be alright if they do as you tell them.

First they have to take a firm hold of the aid, relax and take a couple of deep breaths and start to follow you to the shore by kicking their legs. If they cannot reach the shore without becoming tired, stop, rest, relax, breath deeply and then start kicking again.

Do not let the victim get any nearer than six feet from you, because if they panic and grab at you, you could be in trouble as well.

There is an extra public swim on Tuesday evenings from now until the summer at 8:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Pool office hours are weekdays 5:30 to 10:00 p.m. Saturdays 9:00 to 9:00 p.m. Sundays 2:00 to 9:00 p.m.

If you phone the pool before these times you may not get an answer at the weekends and on weekdays you will get the school board supervisor and they cannot help you with any recreation department program.
