

New executive for Halton-Burlington Tories

A new executive was elected at the annual meeting for the Halton-Burlington Progressive Conservative riding association at the Hornby Towers Golf and Country Club Friday.

Eric Gudgeon, of Georgetown is the new president replacing Fran Balnes; John McArthur, Burlington is first vice-president; E. Robert Reed second vice-president; Irene Saunders, Hornby secretary; and Al Dunn Georgetown, treasurer.

Eric Gudgeon said the exe-

cutive is useless without help and support from people at the grass roots level.

"I hope if we have an election in June we don't get embroiled in politics, and lose sight of the main problem facing Canadian economic problems," he said.

Past President Fran Balnes said the association needs to be prepared and ready if an election is held in June, which involves everyone working together.

Secretary Irene Saunders

stated the balance on hand is \$1,057 and Terry Balnes in charge of finance committee said, "We've a long way to go to complete the campaign, and although several fundraising events have been held, the profits were modest."

Present at the meeting was the Transportation Minister James Snow, who commented that Treasurer Darcy McKeough did not present a "goody budget" but a down-to-earth workable budget.

"There is no room for reduc-

tion in taxes, and the budget has met with favorable comments," Mr. Snow said.

A vote was to be held Tuesday (yesterday) for extending rent control legislation until December, 1978, when wage and price controls are scheduled to terminate. "Rent controls are offensive, but shouldn't be removed until there is more rental units and housing available," he said.

"No decision has been made yet for an election date, but when the time comes, the Progressive Conservative Party wants to come back with a majority government," Mr. Snow said. "A majority government would improve the rate of unemployment and slack economy. In 1975 we lost several ridings by a small majority, but if the association works together promoting George Gray it should have a favorable result," he said.

Bill Kempling, MP for Halton-Wentworth agreed that minority government is not good for the people or for the country.

"Ontario is the battleground for the next election," he said. "The PC's only have 25 seats from a possible 75 in Ontario. It's important we have a good win in all municipalities," Mr.

Kempling said.

Minority government creates pressure and makes it difficult to get any legislation passed. He stated the budget is excellent and will revitalize the economy.

"Davis has been bold bringing in tough legislation during a difficult period, and PC members should be proud of the way he has handled his cabinet," he said.

Frank Wilson, Mr. Gray's campaign manager, set a deadline for June to have everything prepared for an election.

"We may look dumb if we're prepared and there isn't an election, but it would be worse if there was an election and we weren't ready," Mr. Wilson said.

Exposure is the main ingredient and "George is getting out and shaking hands," Mr. Wilson said. Mr. Wilson called for co-operation and assistance from PC members to distribute brochures and work on signs, so it will be possible to "rescue this riding from the Liberals."

Candidate George Gray analyzed what Progressive Conservative stands for.

"A Conservative is a person who believes in free enterprise

and that each person can embark on their own and take advantage of benefits in our society," he said. "With this right, the person is accorded the right to fail and the opportunity for success."

"Conservatives believe in

work ethics and the concept that every person should be prepared to earn their own living," he added. "On the other hand the Conservative concept takes care of those people unable or incapable of earning their own living."

Gray prepared for hustings

George Gray, Progressive Conservative candidate for Halton-Burlington has been waiting one year and 36 days to carry the Tory banner to the polls in the next provincial election, and he doesn't think he has long to wait in fact only about one month.

"We have reached a critical point in the history of our present Ontario government," Mr. Gray said at the annual meeting in Hornby.

"The people returned a minority government in 1975 with 51 Conservative, 38 NDP and

36 Liberal members. Few people expected the minority government to last as long as it has. I give credit to Bill Davis and our party for making this government as effective as it has been," he said.

"I believe, however, that we are approaching an end to the effectiveness of the present government," Mr. Gray continued. In his nomination speech one year ago Mr. Gray expressed concern about the vast deficit in the balance of trade costing Canada jobs and driving up the numbers of the

unemployed.

"My concern was brutally expressed by the closing of the Domtar plant in Georgetown," he said. The unemployment rate of people in the 16-26 age bracket is approaching 15 per cent.

Premier Davis stated in an address to the Empire Club in Toronto that Quebec wants political independence while maintaining an economic union with the rest of Canada. Such a concept was impossible.

Mr. Gray received three phone calls from people he had previously not heard from who said they agreed completely with the Premier's stand.

"The situation in Quebec will continue to boil, and ferment, and it is going to require attention, statesmanship, and ability in order to maintain confederation," Mr. Gray said.

"The time is approaching fast when if the Ontario opposition parties do not cause the government to fall, Mr. Davis should in the interests of Canada, go to the people of Ontario and ask for a majority mandate in order to provide strong opposition to the Liberal government in Ottawa and to provide a strong Conservative government to deal with the socialist leaning PQ government of Quebec," he said.

"We have the opportunity here in Halton-Burlington to return this riding to the government side of the house," he said. "The riding was only lost by 460 votes. At that time the Gallup polls didn't show the 44 per cent popularity in Ontario that we now enjoy," he said.
