Chrysler Raiders Awards Night

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders, 1977 OHA Intermediate "A" Champions held their Annual Awards Night Dance last Saturday at the Way-Jay Sportsmens Club in Norval.

For the first time in memory the Raiders had an extended awards ceremony and it appeared that anyone at all connected with the 1976-77 edition of the Raiders was rewarded in some way.

John Boyce, Raider team captain, in addressing those in attendance, praised the players, executive, fans and the Georgetown community for contributing to the Raiders success over the past hockey campaign. He described this year's team as the best that he has had the pleasure to be associated with and possibly the best in the Raiders long and illustrious history. For their accomplishments during the 1976-77 Intermediate season, the Raiders have a right to crow.

They finished second, behind the Thorold Athletics during regular season OHA Intermediate "A" play then captured the John Ross Robertson Trophy, that symbolizes OHA Intermediate "A" supremacy, by dropping the tenacious Port Colborne Sailors and the pesky Fort Erie Mavericks, in post-season play. This entitled them to journey down the Hardy Cup road, in search of a Canadian Championship.

The Raiders played Timmins in a Hardy Cup quarter-final series, won the first game then the series, when Timmins defaulted.

The next round of Hardy Cup play saw the Raiders tangle with the Val D'Or Voodoos, an All-Star team from the Quebec Intermediate League. The Voodoos won the first game of the best-of-five series, but then the Raiders rallied to win three consecutive games and earn a berth in the Eastern Canada final series of the Hardy Cup.

It was here that the Raiders stumbled, bowing out in three straight games to the Campbellton Tigers (eventual Hardy Cup winners). The Georgetown team however, left the 1976-77 hockey stage with head held high as Campbellton's recruiting tactics, in the veritable underestimation of the year, were open to question.

The climax of the Raiders season came last Saturday night at the Awards Dance, as the team's major awards and an abundance of minor ones were handed out.

Neil Cotton won the Jack Harrison Award, that is awarded annually to the person (or persons) who, in a single season, have performed an outstanding service to the team. Neil stepped in as club President last Spring when it appeared that no one else wanted the job and his contribution to the team both in his executive capacity and as a player, proved irreplaceable.

Bill Currie was chosen the Raiders Most Valuable Player and this award is voted on by the Raider players. Neilson's donation trophies for the top three players on the Raiders, chosen by the fans throughout

the season and Steve Blundy was voted Third Star; Ray Evans was picked Second Star and Mario MacDonald, the Raider stellar netminder won the trophy as the Raiders First Star.

In an emotional presentation John Boyce presented Jack Harrison, who has been associated with the Raiders for 49 years, with a special award on behalf of the players. Jack accepted a framed team picture of the 1976-77 Raider team.

All the Raiders were the beneficiaries of OHA awards as Intermediate "A" Champions. In addition, each player received a team picture. Chris Milne, who joined the Raiders after the Gemini season had been completed also received a team picture, as did Danny Blair, Owen Held and Gary Hill, the three Fort Erie Mavericks players who were picked-up by the Raiders for Hardy Cup play.

The Raiders handed out appreciation medallions this year, to loyal workers and supporters and the recipients included, Trevor Moores, Gary Johnson, Brian James, Bev Hensit, Helen Gilbert, Vic Forde, Bryan Turner, Steve Hoare, Dave Hoare, Dave Lyons, Barry Whitworth, Don McRae (of Georgetown Chrysler) Alex Virag, Dave Kentner, Wendy Cotton, Jim Farquar, Tom Marshall, Jack Handy and Fred Ingley.

All in all, it's been quite a year for the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders.
