Ballinafad homeowners oppose development

proposal for developing a section of his land into 17 lots.

Jack Martin, president of Marbro Ltd., approached Erin Township with his plans of development but council turned it down. Mr. Martin is to attend a hearing before the Ontario Municipal Board May 19 in Hillsburgh.

He will not, however, attend the meeting unchallenged. Several angry residents stated clearly their reason to moving into Ballinafad was because they enjoy the quiet country atmosphere.

A ballot box in Morley Shortill's general store contains the names of Ballinafad residents stating whether they are for or against the housing

Mr. Martin stated he was not there to sway residents to his side, simply to explain his intentions. He owns B5 acres in the northeast corner of the village; including the west half of Lot 1., which he bought two years ago with the intention of developing.

"The land is classified as Grade 4 agricultural land, but the only thing you could grow on this land is pet rocks," Mr. Martin said. He said the lot is designated by Erin township for development.

"I only asked for something that is already slated," he said. "Development may be a dirty word in this group and your protests may delay me, but development will come."

The land designated for development is registered as hamlet under the official plan of the Guelph and Suburban Planning Area board secretary Roger Truemner said This means urban growth is limited to in-filling and

limited expansion in the area. Mr. Martin sald engineering studies were carried out and there is sufficient water available to service the wells. Soils is sufficient to provide for septic tanks.

He wants the home to resemble estate-type homes on three-quarter of an acre lots to be serviced by septic tanks and


