Drug use grows

Use of drugs by Oakville students is increasing but it is not the epidemic that was reported in some newspapers early this year, Halton board of education learned Thursday.

A committee of the board which investigated the reports of drug use in Oakville schools said drug usage is on the increase in the community as the population increases.

This year there have been 65 drug related occurrances accounting for over 100 arrests in Oakville. Most of those arrested are in the 16 to 19 age group.

Drugs seem less a problem now than in the 60's, the board was told, because although youth are using them, they are handling them better. There is little or none of the bizarre behaviour and usage varies from school to school.

Trustee Jim Clelland, Len Crosier and Elsie Hilson, who all were on the committee, recommended that the police work more closely with the schools in combating student drug use. They also suggested that the board set some policy to support school principals in drug investigations which occur in schools and possible suspensions for drug users and
