It services a few sub-division streets. The route follows Main Street to Maple, along Maple Avenue to Delrex to Edward Street, up Prince Charles, through the plaza to Duncan and over to Weber back to Delrex and over to Highway 7. It travels through Norval to Huttonville.

Travelways operates a separate bus line and anyone wanting to board the bus flags it down.

A dispatcher for Travelways Lines said buses aren't that well travelled because the first bus leaves at 5:50 a.m. and another at 2:30 p.m. Travelways operates three buses picking up high school students from the east end of town. These are well travelled, particularly in the winter.

"We need an in-town bus service route especially for families to use in the evenings," she said.
