Both sides came up in blisters and that winter I was the belle of the ball where I went in a low-cut dress. The tan just didn't stop, front and back.

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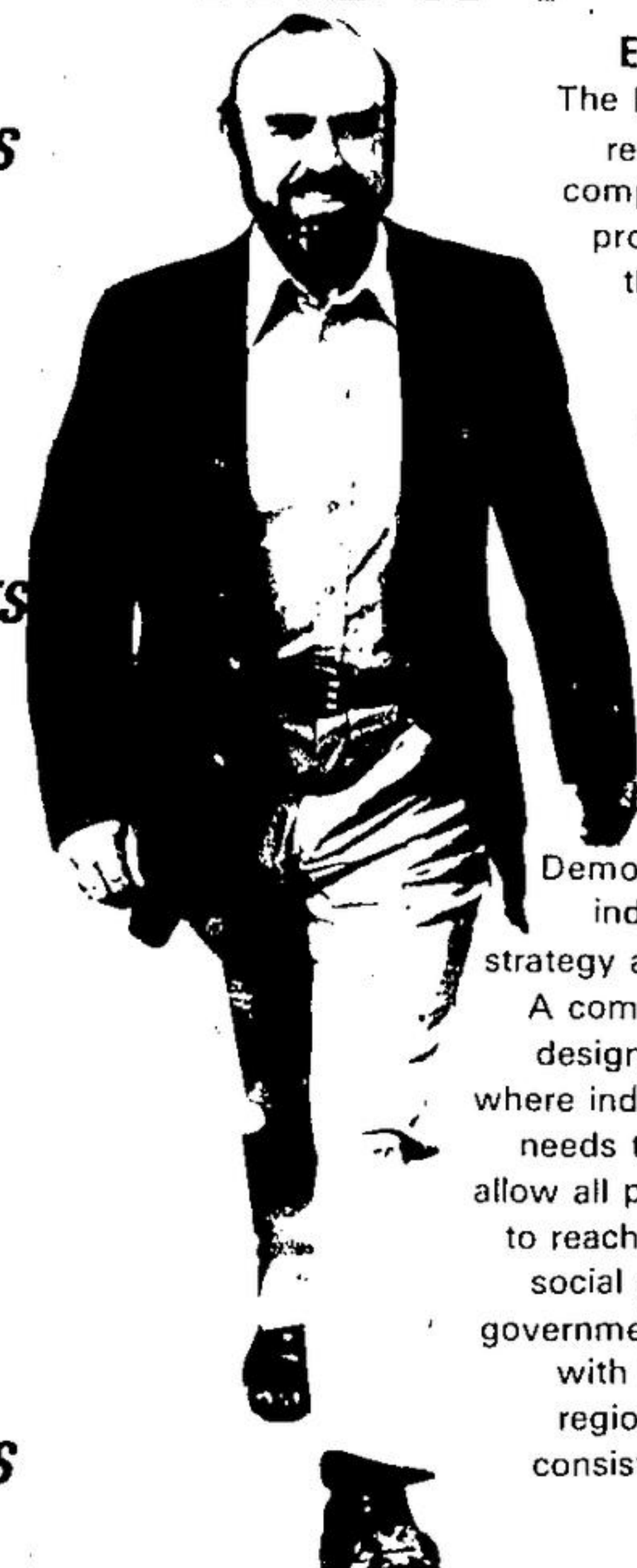
