flooding the ditch. Mr. Williams lifted the truck off the accident victim and removed her from the ditch.

Frank Collins of Oakville was credited with saving the life of a 2½-year-old child who had been found by his mother at the bottom of the family swimming pool. Mr. Collins responded to the mother's call for help and gave mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to revive the child.

John Silveira of Oakville was commended for helping five persons, two of them infants, with escaping from a third floor apartment in a building which was on fire. He found a ladder, climbed up it and helped the people escape.

Wolfgang Panknin of Clarkson assisted a police officer who had found two persons acting suspiciously in a phone booth with marijuana and hash pipes. While the officer kept the two men contained, Mr. Panknin used the police radio to call for help, then assisted the officer until another came.

Michael Hoffman, an off-duty firefighter in Oakville, was found by police to be giving mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and heart massage to an elderly man who had been stricken while driving. Taking over from Paulette Houcks, who had found the stricken man, Mr. Hoffman's actions are credited with saving the man's life.

George Patton of Oakville helped a police officer who was trying to arrest a man for creating a disturbance and assaulting his girlfriend. As the man was being out

into the back of the cruiser, his girlfriend attacked the officer and it was at this point that Mr. Patton entered to help the officer in a 15-minute struggle until reinforcements arrived. Mr. and Mrs. Patton indicated to police at the time that they would be willing to be witnesses in court.

Ed Braddock of Oakville went to the aid of a police officer who had crashed during a high speed chase. After noting that the police driver was uninjured, Mr. Braddock with his wife in the car, chased the suspected vehicle to the Milton Plaza at speeds of 100 miles per hour and gave police a description of the occupants which led to their arrest.

John Manchester of Oakville witnessed an accident in which a policeman had been struck by a car. The police officer was suffering a broken leg and severe lacerations and Mr. Manchester removed his belt and applied a tourniquet as well as dressings. After an ambulance removed the injured officer, Mr. Manchester gave a statement as a witness.

The incident which got Burlington resident John Prinzen his citation had all the drama of a movie thriller. Police Chief Ken Skerrett said,

"A suspicious man came to Mr. Prinzen's door to ask to call a taxi but when the man saw a police car, he ran into a nearby wood. As police searched the area, Mr. Prinzen called his neighbors and got the impression over the phone that all was not right at one of them. He alerted police of his suspicion and the suspect was caught hiding in the basement with a five-inch imitation

switchblade knife. Mrs. June Bright and John Nielsen were credited with observing and reporting the suspicious actions of three persons in a parking lot. Police eventually arrested two adults for break and enter and Mrs. Bright was willing to be a court witness. A third party was later arrested.

Nisbet Forsyth of Burlington was passing by when a scuffle occurred between a police officer and a man he was questioning on the street. Mr. Forsyth assisted the officer, who had abrasions on his hands and torn clothing, to snap handcuffs on the suspect. The suspect was charged with break and enter.

Robert Weir of Burlington saw two youths entering the cars at the rear parking lot of the apartment building where he lives. He seized the youths and their body from five cars and held them until police arrived.

Police commissioner Glenn Magnuson of Georgetown presented 11 police officers with long service awards. Deputy chief Jack Jeffries and Staff Sergeant F. Pearce received bars for 30 years of service.

Inspector Fred Gaylard, who was absent, Sergeant H.L. Heath, Superintendent George Moore and Inspector Allan Stansbury received the 25 year bar.

Receiving the 20-year award were: Sergeant Robert Allerink, Constable Harry Beckman, Sergeant Lance Brider, Sergeant Peter Brumley, Constable J.P. Gushie, Sergeant Tom Ruiney, Sergeant I. Robinson and Sergeant Douglas Stanford.

Teen recounts experience as police observer

Fourteen-year-old Brad McIntyre took advantage of the car ride-along program during Police Week, and was surprised at the number of hours police spend patrolling the area.

During his four-hour ride with Constable Jim Turner of Area 1, Brad talked on the radio giving details of a car left at Smith and Stone, which after investigating circumstances turned out to be abandoned and was later towed away.

Brad waited in the hall of Centennial school while Constable Turner discussed something with the principal, and then from there over to the fire station for gas.

During the patrol Constable Turner showed Brad the different switches for the flashing red light, and talked shop telling him Area 1 had four cruisers, one van, one Ford Bronco and one unmarked car. The route included patrol-

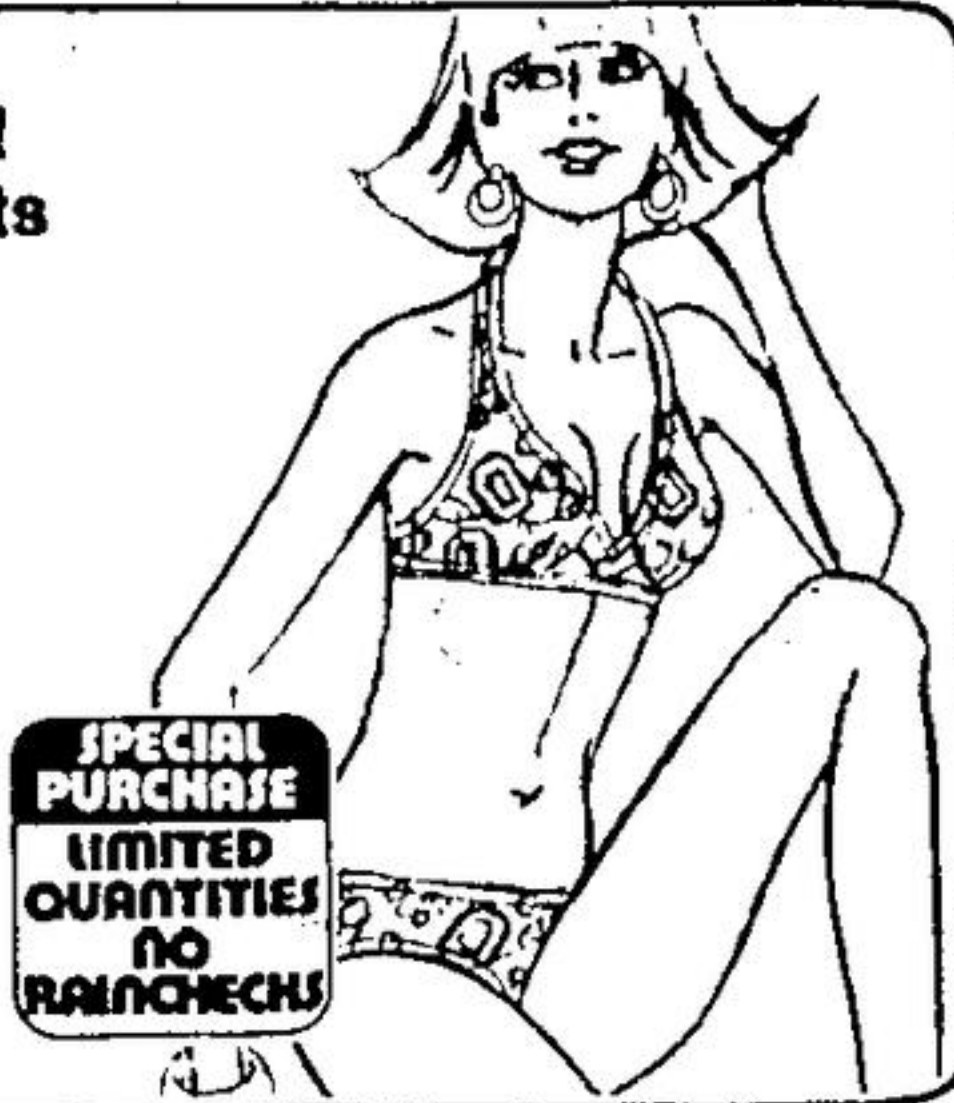

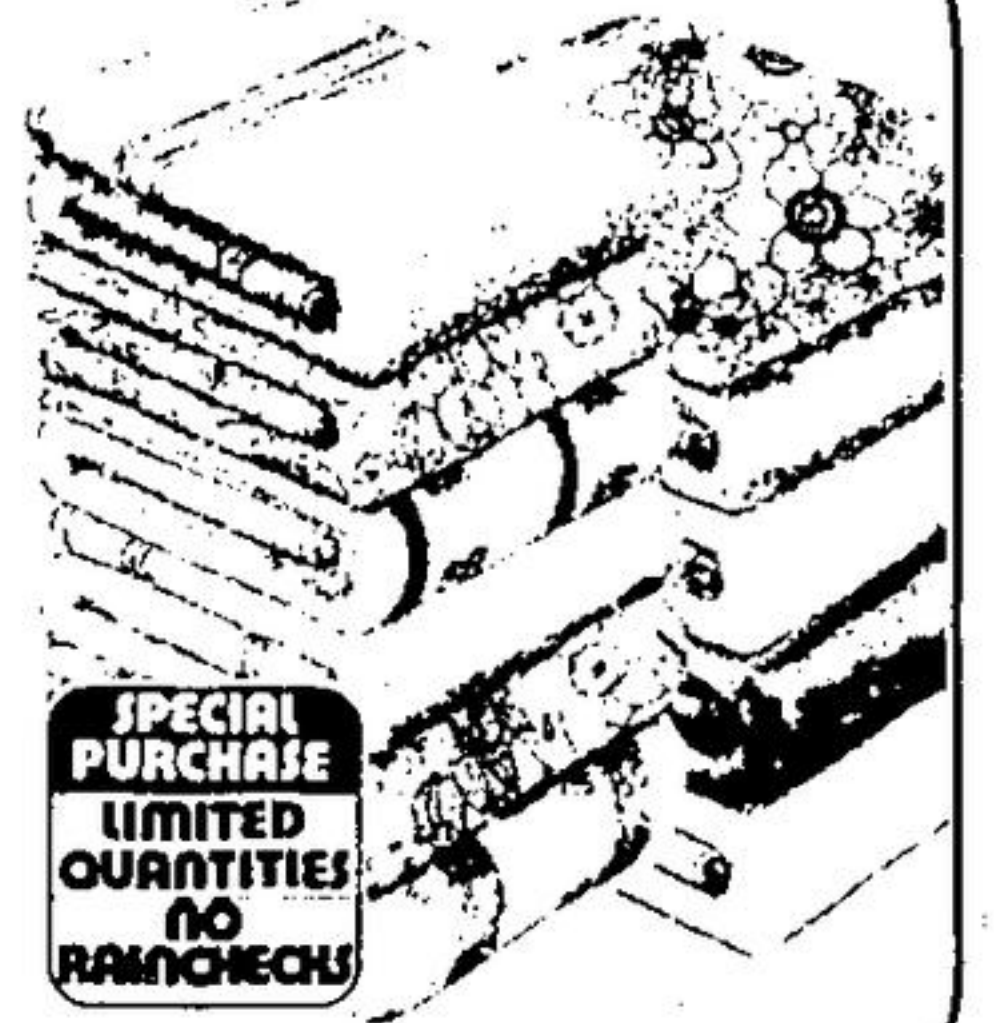
