Glen Williams off to A shaky start

Lanes Transport, the Glen Williams entry in the Halton Men's Fastball League were chopping at the bit, several weeks ago, anxious for the 1977 regular season to get underway.

The Glen team had attracted a number of newcomers and stories from the Lanes camp had them eying the league championship with covetous glances.

The Glen men swung into regular season action last week, with two games, but the results were not very satisfying to say the least.

Last Tuesday (May 17) Hornby invaded the Glen Ball Park and behind a stellar pitching performance by Moe Curtis, posted a 4-1 win. Last Friday, the Glen squad journeyed to Lowville for their first tilt of the season against the defending league champions, but Lowville put a crimp in the villager's aspirations by posting a comfortable 10-1 win. A game report on the Friday night contest was not available.

On Tuesday, however, the difference was Hornby's hurler Moe Curtis. Prior to the season, the word circulating around the league was that Moe wouldn't be as effective this year because the Halton loop had adopted OASA rules and intended to strictly enforce pitching regulations.

In the past, Moe has been known to saunter around the mound until the feeling was right and then let loose with a pellet while clinging to the rubber with the barest scrap of a toe nail. The contention was that since Moe had to settle on the mound before delivering and then, with both feet in contact with the rubber, let loose with a pitch, his style would be cramped.

If Moe's style suffered on Tuesday, the Glen would like to know about it. Curtis threw the full nine innings, limiting the Glen to seven hits and one earned run, while walking three and striking out seven.

Mike Pierce was charged with the loss and he worked eight-and-two-thirds innings,

allowing seven hits, four runs, issuing four bases on balls and fanning four batters. Jeff Haines who surely is being overworked what with Halton County, Industrial and Glen minor games in his schedule got the final Hornby out in the ninth inning.

The game was tight until Pierce faltered in the ninth frame. The Glen drew first blood in the second inning, when left fielder, Mike Reynolds, with his first of a pair of hits, knocked in James Moody with what proved to be the Glen's only run of the game.

In the top of the second, Hornby pushed up the lead they were not to relinquish.

Over the next five innings, until the Hornby outburst in the ninth, Curtis and Pierce locked horns in a pitchers duel.

For the first outing of the year, for both clubs, play was remarkably crisp. There was only one error in the game, committed by Glen Williams third baseman, Steve Pierce, and both pitchers were in fine form.

Aside from Reynolds, Howie Moody was credited with seven putouts, while Mike Reynolds rapped out hits for the Glen. McDowell had a pair of bingles for Hornby, including a single, while Patterson, Brian Feavoy, Andy Trences, Rick Feavoy and Juri Kudrasovs collected the other hits.

The Glen will have a chance to get on the winning track this week.
