## Students raise issues at meeting

All candidate meetings were held at two secondary schools, Lester B. Pearson and M.M. Robinson, and surprisingly, although the candidates touched on problems confronting graduating students in the job market, the students themselves raised other issues; Site F landfill, and the wage and price control issue.

NDP candidate Bill Johnson lashed out at people who knock the education system, claiming that they know little if anything about it. "There are too many people knocking the education system," he contended. "I don't buy their criticisms."

Johnson lay the blame squarely on the shoulders of the present Conservative government for not having jobs available for graduating students. "Unemployment is not a job for you upon graduation," he pointed out. "And the Conservatives can be blamed for this. They have failed miserably in handling unemployment."

Johnson charged there is no free enterprise system operating in Ontario, rather "private enterprise." George Gray, the Conservative candidate said there are a great deal of opportunities for youth if they were willing to work.

He felt that his party is working hard to attract new industries to assure jobs for youth and attacked wage and price controls as contributing to the unemployment problem. "We should phase out wage and price controls," he stated, "they have taken away people's incentive."

Incumbent Liberal member of the former house, questioned Mr. Gray's criticism of wage and price controls contending "it (the phasing out) is not part of the Conservatives policy."

Reed espoused the belief that "unemployment, especially for young graduates, is the most serious problem facing Ontario at this time."

He felt that the "foundation of the province" is the small businessman and that it is in this area that improvement must come.

He ridiculed the "Charter of Ontario" - the Conservative manifesto released last week - as a hollow document, and "proof," he said, "that the Conservatives have failed."

Reed cited the calling of the election; the unemployment problem and the Conservative manifesto as key issues in the campaign.

The Site F question raised by students showed the three candidates unanimously opposed to its use.

George Gray, said that he had submitted a brief last November, opposed to Site F and stated that the government had offered the region \$7 million for a resource recovery plant.

Julian Reed is critical of the government for failing to adjust to the times. Bill Johnson issued a blanket condemnation, stating the government should "ban long-term landfill sites."

He suggested that any sites should be licensed for a maximum of five years, with applications for extensions required for not more than a further year.

"The technology is here," he pointed out. "It should be applied."

In reply to a question concerning government aid to big business, George Gray feels the government is doing what it could to aid business in general.

Julian Reed harked back to his claim that the small businessman is the foundation of the province's economy and said the education structure should offer more management training.

"The education system should orient itself to exposing young people to the idea of entrepreneurship," he offered.

Bill Johnson says big business is getting the lion's share

of the money the province is doing out and claims this should stop.

He feels that what is needed, is a tax break for the small businessman.

Julian Reed claims that the government is engaged in deficit budgeting dispersing more funds than it collects and creating an inflationary situation.

He suggested that a solution to the problem would be to budget on a zero-budget-basis working from the bottom up, expending what is needed as it is needed rather than the

current way of doing things.

Bill Johnson stated simply that inflation could be stopped by increasing productivity. He felt the Anti Inflation Board (AIB) is "totally wrong" and hits the working man harder than big business.

George Gray blamed the federal government's cost-sharing program, especially OJIP for the present situation. He said "obviously, we (the Conservatives) want a balanced budget."

There was little demonstrable reaction from the students throughout the meeting, but all three candidates had been well received.

## Ontario St. developments

Proposals for two developments on Ontario Street went before Planning Board last week and were referred to the planner for a preliminary report.

Fourteen acres of land owned by Morris Stein would be converted into 64 lots and a green block fronting on a cul-de-sac and a loop street. Since the property is hilly, the homes would be back-split and side-split single family dwellings as well as conventional two-storey homes.

Robert Cliphsham spoke on

behalf of the developer in explaining how the services needed for the lots could be connected to existing water and sewage lines on Ewing Street.

Mr. Cliphsham also outlined plans by Norman Mitchell to convert 1.8 acres of land on Ontario Street just east of

Main Street into eight lots. The lots would be built around a cul-de-sac off Main Street North and a house on that street would be moved to one of the new lots to provide access to Main Street he said.

Both properties are already zoned R-3 residential.
