Today council is expected to approve a tender for the construction of a new headquarters at a site adjacent to the Ontario sports centre on Bronte Road at the Queen Elizabeth Way, Oakville.

Committee members felt the proposal from Joseph Willmott for the land at Derry Road and Highway 25 has come too late for any action to be taken. Architectural planning for the Oakville site is completed and tenders have been called.

Mayor Gordon said the Willmott's have been residents of Halton for 150 years and are reknown for their public ser-vice and wish to make the property a gift to the region.


He said the land is situated at the geographical centre of the region near a developing mall with servicing readily
