# 23 new records set at Centennial meet

Centennial Public School held their annual Track and Field Meet last Thursday and a combination of circumstances made it one of the best in recent memory.

The weatherman cooperated by providing a glorious summer day and the 2,264 participants represented the largest ever number of students who have ever taken part in the one day affair.

In addition, 23 new school records were broken and two were tied. Coach, Alice Ogden pointed out that the most popular event for the boys proved to be the high jump. The previous high for entrants was 160, but this year 224 boys reached for the clouds. Only one new event for the girls 800 metre race, was featured in the Centennial program.

Chris Zillo won the Junior girls hurdles with Pat Heideman placing second and

Kim Newcombe placing third. Maureen Gale topped the field in the Intermediate girls hurdles. Teri Lamb was second and Heather Gibbs placed third.

Linda Ferguson edged out Kim MacLeod in the Senior girls hurdles while Jane Cartwright placed third.

Jamie South won the Junior boys hurdles with Mark Williams placing second and Paul Burroughs finishing third. Kirk Warnock led the field in the Intermediate boys hurdles with Shawn Zuber coming in second and Jeff Waterworth placing third.

The Senior boys hurdles was won by Bob Dean in a new school record time of 11.9 seconds. Mike Gibson was second, while Ron Bell placed third.

In the Junior girls 60 metre dash, Rosemary Gale established a new school record of 9.0 seconds, finishing ahead of Arlene Gray and Sheryl Few.

The Intermediate girls 100 metre dash was won by Val Williams. Diane Lough placed second and Ruth Alworth was third. In the Senior girls 100 metre event Nancy Vetricek paced the field, Jean Galbraith was second and Sherry Hawkins placed third.

Brad Hansen won the Junior boys 60 metre dash, closely followed by Gary Lockwood and David Murray. The Intermediate boys 100 metre dash was captured by Wayne Manuel, Dave Mason was second, while Rod Cook placed third.

Brian Davis finished a full second ahead of his competitors in setting a new school record of 12.5 seconds in the Senior boys 100 metre dash. Jamie Burt was second and Uli Sommer finished in third place.

Connie Hay ran away with the title in the Junior girls 200 metre event, Jennifer Pepper was second and Kim Kirk placed third. The Intermediate girls 200 metre dash was won by Elizabeth Ramsay, Teri Lamb was second and Sheila Surikow placed third.

Jean Galbraith set a new school record of 29.8 seconds in winning the Senior girls 200 metre dash, Linda Ferguson was second and Pam Brabant placed third.

Gary Lockwood won the Junior boys 200 metre dash, Kevin McArthur was second and Lloyd Mieczanec was third. Wayne Manuel paced the pack in the Intermediate boys 200 metre event, Kirk Warnock was second and Andy Kovarski was third.

A new school record of 26.9 seconds was established by Brian Davis in the Senior boys 200 metre dash, Bob Dean placed second and Mike Gibson was third. Kathy Webb got herself in

the school's record books by setting a new record of 73.0 seconds in the Junior girls 400 metre event, Arlene Gray was second and Cheryl Thompson was third.

A new school record of 71.5 seconds was established by Maureen Gale in the Intermediate girls 400 metre event, Elizabeth Ramsay was second and Carolyn Batten placed third.

The Senior girls 400 metre race was won by Heather Reed in the record time of 69.7 seconds, but second place finisher Sue Krowchuk also bettered the old mark with a time of 70.9 seconds. Chris Woycheko placed third, just 2.3 seconds off the pace.

Mike Wroblewski won the Junior boys 400 metre race, Steve Brown was second and Bob Sweeney placed third. Eric Elson claimed the title in the Intermediate girls 400 metre race, Scott Hall was second, while Steve Tancoo placed third.

Doug Smith set a new mark of 60.5 seconds in winning the Senior boys 400 metre event, Graham Hill was second and Matt Phillips placed third.

The Junior boys 800 metre event was won by Mike Wroblewski, Dave Doucette placed second and Scott Pentesco was third. In the Intermediate boys 800 metre event, Eric Elson led the field, Mark Heideman was second and Chris Manhire was third.

Doug Smith won the Senior boys 800 metre race, Jeff Nickerson was second and Bobby Davey was third.

The Junior girls 800 metre event was won by Cheryl Thompson, Kathy Webb was second and Judy Vetricek placed third. Karen Sparks won the Intermediate girls 800 metre event, Sandra Marinuk was second and Lianne Payne finished third. Heather Reed nipped the tape first in the Senior girls 800 metre event, Chris Woycheko was second and Charlene Woycheko placed third.

House No. 3 won the Junior girls relay, House No. 1 won the Intermediate girls relay, in a new record time of 60.5 seconds and House No. 3 won the Senior girls relay in a new record time of 59.4 seconds.

House No. 1 established a new school record of 61.5 in winning the Junior boys relay event, House No. 3 won the Intermediate boys relay and House No. 5 won the Senior boys relay in a new record time of 53.4 seconds.

Kim Kirk and Connie Hay tied for first in the Junior girls long jump, Deane Jones was second and Kim Newcombe placed third.

Val Williams set a school record by leaping for 4.33 metres in the Intermediate girls long jump. Suzanne

Abray was second and Kary Jones placed third.

In the Intermediate girls long jump, Nancy Vetricek set a new school mark of 4.18 metres, Hermanna Veira was second and Pam Brabant placed third.

Brad Hansen won the Junior boys long jump, followed by Scott Pentesco and Phil Hese. Dave Mason leaped the farthest in the Intermediate boys long jump, Kevin Franks placed second and Andy Kovarski was third.

The Senior boys long jump was won by Doug Smith, Bill Nelson was second and Uli Sommer placed third.

Rosemary Gale won the Junior girls triple jump, Jennifer Pepper was second and Arlene Maitland placed third. Sheila Surikow showed the best style in winning the Intermediate girls triple jump, Diane Lough placed second, while Karen Coleman finished third.

In the Senior girls triple jump, Sherry Hawkins was first, Hermanna Veira was second and Debbie Gillespie placed third.

The Junior boys triple jump was won by Paul Burroughs, Jamie South placed second and John Beaumont was third. Rod Cook out-leaped his foes in the Intermediate boys triple jump, Mark Heideman was second and Paul Karoldis placed third.

Brian Davis set a new school mark when he won the Senior boys triple jump with a leap of 10.9 metres, Graham Hill, in second place, also broke the old standard, and David Watson finished in third place.

Sheryl Few won the Junior girls high jump, Jennifer Pepper was second and Rosemary Gale placed third. Val Williams leaped to a new

school record of 1.48 metres in winning the Intermediate girls high jump, Noel Jefferson was second and Michelle Richmond placed third.

In the Senior girls high jump, Sue Krowchuk established a new school mark of 1.42 metres in winning the event, Nancy Vetricek was second and Chris Beaumont placed third.

The Junior boys high jump was won by Jamie South in a new school mark of 1.40 metres, Harold Branch and David Murray tied for second, and Dave Doucette placed third.
