## SOCCER REPORT

# Injuries to be treated with proper attention

Our season got off to a fine start over the long weekend and the first goal was late into the season going to Mark Rose of the Peeewe's side. The report of this and other matches have been mentioned elsewhere.

In general, matters have gone quite well with only a few problems. The refereeing over the first two weeks has been of a good standard and turnout almost 100 per cent. The matches are keenly contested and already the signs of front runners are beginning to show. The executive have promised to keep a watchful eye for any runaway leaders and to amend any strong imbalance.

The first coaches and managers meeting was well attended and a few good points were raised. In the case of an injured player, last month I suggested that a sponge and cold water are ideal for most knocks. It is best to leave any injured player alone or to an experienced soccer adult in the

absence of qualified soccer medics, but normally most knocks can be taken care by use of sponge and water and little further aggravation will result.

A recent national coaches seminar brought out the lack of specialised medics in soccer injuries and we are not alone in this respect. If an injury looks serious immediate removal to the local hospital accident department is recommended.

Over the past few years I am informed that serious injuries are very few and difficult to recall.

Some imbalance of players sizes was discussed and the executive will watch the situation - so far the differences between some of the Peeewe-Bantam has not affected results and playing standards. The new conduct code was also introduced and discussed and also seems to be working well so far. The code is a set of simple rules to follow in regard to match play, behaviour, coaches and managers duties, what to do in

case of a referee shortage and how to deal with the match result. The next meeting is at Cedarville on Monday, June 13 8:10 p.m. to which all coaches, managers and referees are invited.

Regrettably some were not aware of the first meeting until the last minute, so please reserved the second Monday of each month for meetings same time and place.

Minor soccer's opinion of facilities and fields has been reported in earlier issues of the newspaper. You may have seen some of minor soccer officials on the field. We have checked the specifications and the field is not prepared even to the specifications. The contractor accepts the fact and is to attend to the problems and faults, thereby causing a further delay in the re-opening date. But for our vigilance where would we be?

The laws of the game often bring out differences of interpretation and one which caused concern recently was the one concerning obstruction on a goal keeper. A player is judged to obstruct a goalkeeper by attempting to prevent the keeper from clearing the ball. The outfield player can obstruct by standing immediately in front of the keeper. However, provided the attacker does not move as the keeper takes the 4 allowed steps around the attacker there is no award of an indirect free kick.

Should the attacker move to block the keeper's path, obstruction is called and an indirect free kick awarded. This applies whether or not the keeper rolls the ball to gain in some space for the clearance.

However, should the keeper have plenty of time and space to move and clear the ball and rolls the ball an attacker may move in and attempt to gain possession without causing an obstruction. The application is one of interpretation by the referee. Next time out I shall attempt the offside law, the most difficult law to apply and yes, is straightforward enough in print.

A Random Thought  
A simple yet effective tactic at goal kicks and keeper's clearances is to pull the wingers deep into your own half yet wide out near the touchline, and to position defenders in line with the goalie just outside the penalty area. This gives the goalkeeper at least four areas to clear to and if defenders and wingers are taught to move into position immediately the keeper has the ball in his hands. A quick counterattack by throw or kick may be achieved. Another more simple, yet essential unwritten "law" is never put the ball across the face of your own
