League President clamps down

Bob Fendley, a player with the Niners Sports Outfitters team in the Georgetown Industrial Softball League, has been suspended for a minimum of 20 games and possibly the balance of the 1977 season, according to an announcement by league president, Bryan Lewis.

The suspension is a result of an incident in a game played Sunday June 5, between Niners and Peel Police. The game was subsequently called off as a result of the incident.

In a letter written to Wayne King, Manager of Niners Sports Outfitters, Lewis ex-

pressed regret at having to leave the suspension but noted that since "He (Fendley) has chosen not to play in the league by the rules, so I (Lewis) have no choice but to suspend Bob Fendley for the balance of the current playing season and playoffs."

The letter went on to point out that Fendley would be given the right to appeal the league's decision, "...but the league will not entertain his current suspension until at least 20 games have been played by his team."

Fendley is further prohibited from acting as Manager, bat-

boy, trainer or in any way is he permitted within the playing field during Georgetown Industrial League games.

Lewis' letter concluded by pointing out, "A decision of this nature does not come easy for anyone to make, and as I have, stated repeatedly, everyone playing in this league has to get up and go to work in the morning and I'm sure that everyone would like it to remain this way. I am a firm believer that everyone desires to play ball for fun, exercise, and enjoyment and should be afforded the opportunity to do so, of which this League will continue to permit those so desiring to do."
