Monday in a game played in Georgetown. The Issue was decided early, as the Georgettes built up a commanding 8-0 lead after four innings, and never looked back.


Milton's lone run of the contest came in the top of the sixth inning but by that time, it was no contest. Sue Paul, the young lady from Acton who has joined


