## Hinton rebuked

School trustee H. H. (Bert) Hinton received a public rebuke from board chairman Rev. Garry Morton, Thursday during debate on an employee assistance program the board passed which would provide help to teachers suffering from alcoholism, drug addiction or emotional problems.

If Hinton is consistent with national statistics, about 150 of the region's 2,500 teachers would be in need of such a program.

Trustee Hinton said that if the teacher federations want to involve themselves in helping afflicted teachers, that's fine but for the board to do it, "It's not our job to spend time on them."

The board should get such teachers out of the system until they are cured, he said. At this point, Mr. Morton, who as chairman is not permitted to discuss a motion before the board, turned over the seat to Noel Cooper, the

vice-chairman, so he could speak. "In the day and age in which we live," Mr. Morton said, "until employers recognize that alcohol is a disease, we won't make any headway."

As the largest employer in the region, the board should be setting an example in this area, Mr. Morton said.

Mr. Hinton, however, had the last word before the board passed the motion. After asking if the assistance program would include board members as well as principals and area superintendents, Mr. Hinton said, "I don't resist the Christian attitude of helping your fellow man, but maybe something is wrong if we're bringing such people into the system."

Haltom Helping Hands, an organization dedicated to helping senior citizens and handicapped persons, is looking for volunteers.

The assistance provided to the handicapped and senior citizens allows them to remain independent in their own homes, Barb Stevens said.

Whether volunteers work a full week, or one day, or even only a few hours, a special sensitivity to the needs of senior citizens and the handicapped is needed, she said.

The group, now in its fourth year, helps about 70 persons in Haltom Hills.

The work includes yard work, window washing, mending and sewing, shopping, visiting, light cleaning, emergency meals, odd jobs and driving patients to appointments. For more information, call Barb Stevens at 878-2226.

## Town to study 'tidying up' walkway at Prospect Park

Town works will assess possible ways of "tidying up" an area of land in Acton used as a pedestrian walkway into Prospect Park.

The request was made by Ward 1 Coun. Peter Marks and will be discussed at the June 27 meeting of works committee.

The small area near Elmore Drive presents two specific "hazards," according to Coun. Marks, which could be eliminated by the town. He described a jutting piece of fencing and a six-foot deep ditch that have until now escaped the attention of parks maintenance crews.

Deputy engineer Ted Ballinger agreed that the area "does not receive as much attention" as most parklands, but noted that the works committee had failed to rectify the problem on one previous occasion. Coun. Les Duby explained that at that time, the committee decided the work required to fill in the ditch would be too costly.

Coun. Pat McKenzie added that the committee's plans to at least "tidy up" the area following a visit there during a 1974 roads tour were never carried out.

Although Coun. Marks suggested that the ditch be filled in and either seeded or sodded, Mr. Ballinger pointed out that a drainage pipe would also be

needed to bring water away from nearby properties. He estimated that a 24-inch pipe for the 100-foot long ditch would cost \$1,500 while sodding or seeding would boost the total price to \$2,500.

Mr. Ballinger commented that the area is not heavily used by pedestrians and that the neighboring homeowners

are mostly concerned about its unsightly and somewhat hazardous condition.

At the committee's direction Mr. Ballinger agreed to investigate the possibilities of extending a pipeline from existing drainage pipes in the park and of obtaining fill from the Main Street reconstruction project to level off the ditch.

## Moores calm at airshow

Trevor Moores, 55 Fagan Drive, Georgetown, stood calmly outside the Canadian Warplane Heritage (CWH) hanger at Mount Hope Airport, Friday, as preparation for an International Air Show were carried on around him.

Seemingly unconcerned, Mr. Moores, announcer of the flight schedule was aware of the work and hours Heritage air squadron leaders had spent in the last six months preparing for the show.

A combination of Heritage war planes and Snowbird planes from the Canadian Armed Forces, take-off from the airfield and head for Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children.

Planes were wheeled from the Heritage restoration hanger and from other hangers onto the airfield. Mr. Moores, an air traffic controller at Toronto International Airport, said he was a pilot in the Navy for five years, but is content at this point in time, to remain on the ground.

(On a tour of the planes being restored in the CWH hanger, Mr. Moores said he receives a

great feeling of accomplishment after a plane is re-built. "These planes have much more character than the new jets."

An air traffic controller of 26 years, he has seen the advancement from propeller-driven planes to the new Boeing 747.

The Heritage hanger represents almost an aircraft museum, primarily of warplanes of Second World War vintage.

"Although a lot of people were not involved in the war, they are interested in the planes," he said.

Seven types of planes were

in the hanger for restoration. These included: a Yale, a Hurricane, a Corsair, an Avenger, a Sea Fire, a Lysander, and an Arsen. One plane was masked, resembling a car about to be painted in a body shop.

Mr. Moores estimated the cost of the Air Show at \$60,000, and was hopeful for a crowd of 30,000 to 40,000.

Highlights of the air Show, he announced included a glider demonstration, aerobatics performance, parachute demonstrations, and a mock bombing by a Heritage B-25 bomber and aircraft of the Confederate Air Force.

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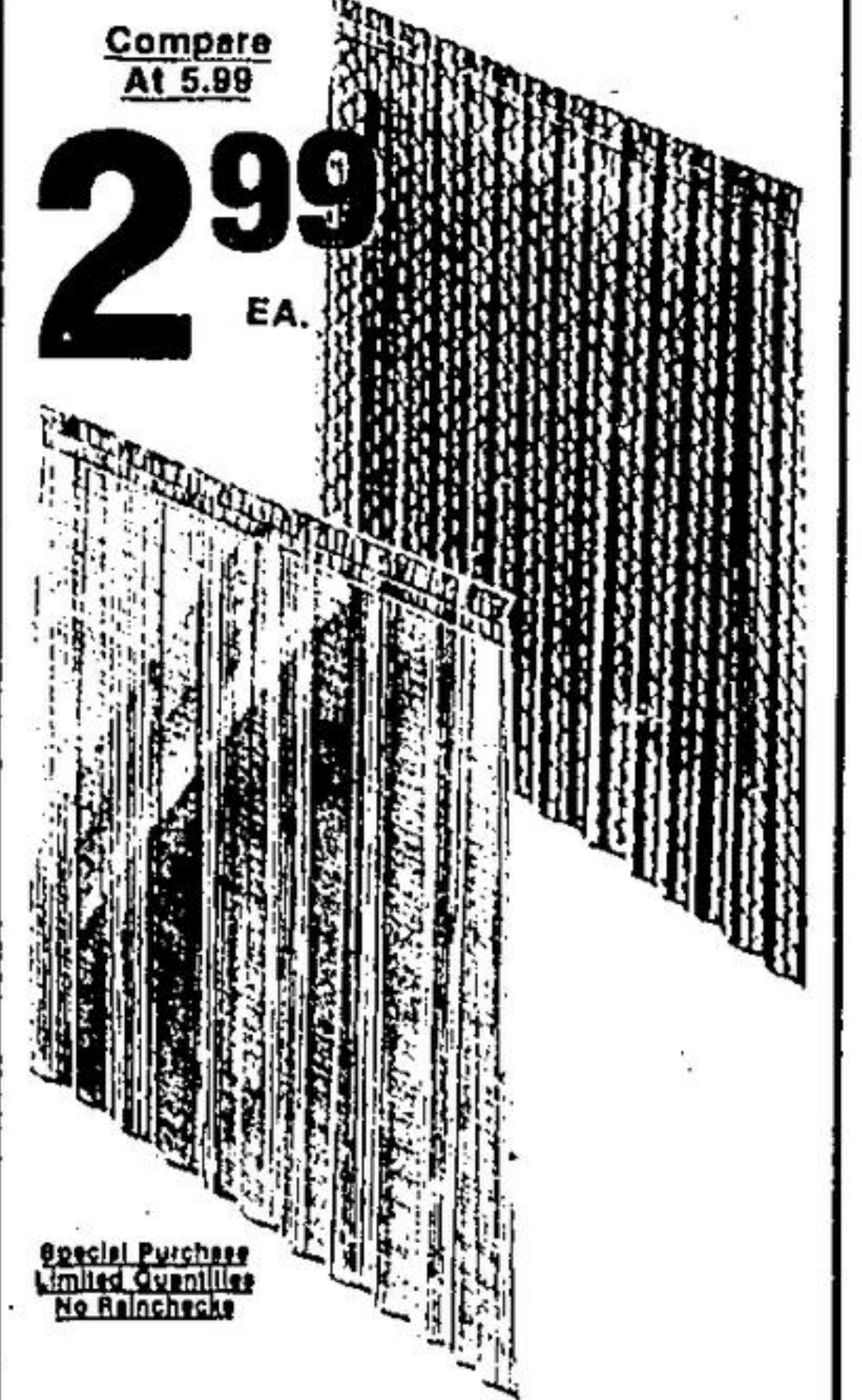
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
