Council supports Scott Paper

Hydro zoning delayed

Halton Hills council failed to be moved by an appeal from Ontario Hydro on Monday to amend zoning bylaws and the Esquing official plan to permit construction of an east-west and a north-south high voltage transmission corridor through the town.

On the east-west line, the Halton Hills section is the only outstanding land, John Bousfield, a planning consultant with Ontario Hydro told council. Hydro owns the right of way on the rest of that corridor.

Mr. Bousfield asked council to consider how the public interest not only of Halton Hills but all Southern Ontario could be served by further delay of the east-west line.

All ten members of council present supported the position that the line not be built until an independent study be done on the route and alternative routes. The east-west corridor is from Nanticoke generating station to Toronto. The north-south route is from Bruce nuclear generating station to Lake Huron to Toronto.

Coun. Russ Miller said On-

ario Hydro knew an amendment to the zoning bylaw and official plan was needed yet built the corridor "right to our borders." Councillor Miller favors an independent study.

Coun. George Malby said his main concern is Hydro's lack of complete honesty, especially in dealing with the people on the north-south line.

Hydro has not laid all its cards on the table and many municipalities have spent considerable sums of money trying to extract honesty from the utility," Mr. Malby said.

Coun. Peter Marks wondered if a moratorium on construction is really hurting the public and industry in southern Ontario in view of the fact that
