EXPLORE AFRICA

EGYPT
 Cairo: The capital city of Egypt dates back to 969 AD, when a Fatimid conquering army from North Africa staked out its military capital here. However, there were settlements in the area from the time of the pharaohs. Today with a population of over four million, this vital city is the

cultural and political hub of the Middle East. While in Cairo we'll travel 10 miles southwest of the city to see the Sphinx and the Great Pyramids of Giza. We'll also visit the Egyptian Museum which has many treasures of ancient Egypt, including the fabulous Tut-Ankh-Amon collection. A number of

mummies, some superb statuary and a copy of the Rosetta Stone. Cairo has some of the most beautiful mosques in the Islamic world - some 400 of them reflecting all periods of Moslem rule - a few which we will visit during our stay.
 Luxor: A trip to Egypt would not be complete without an

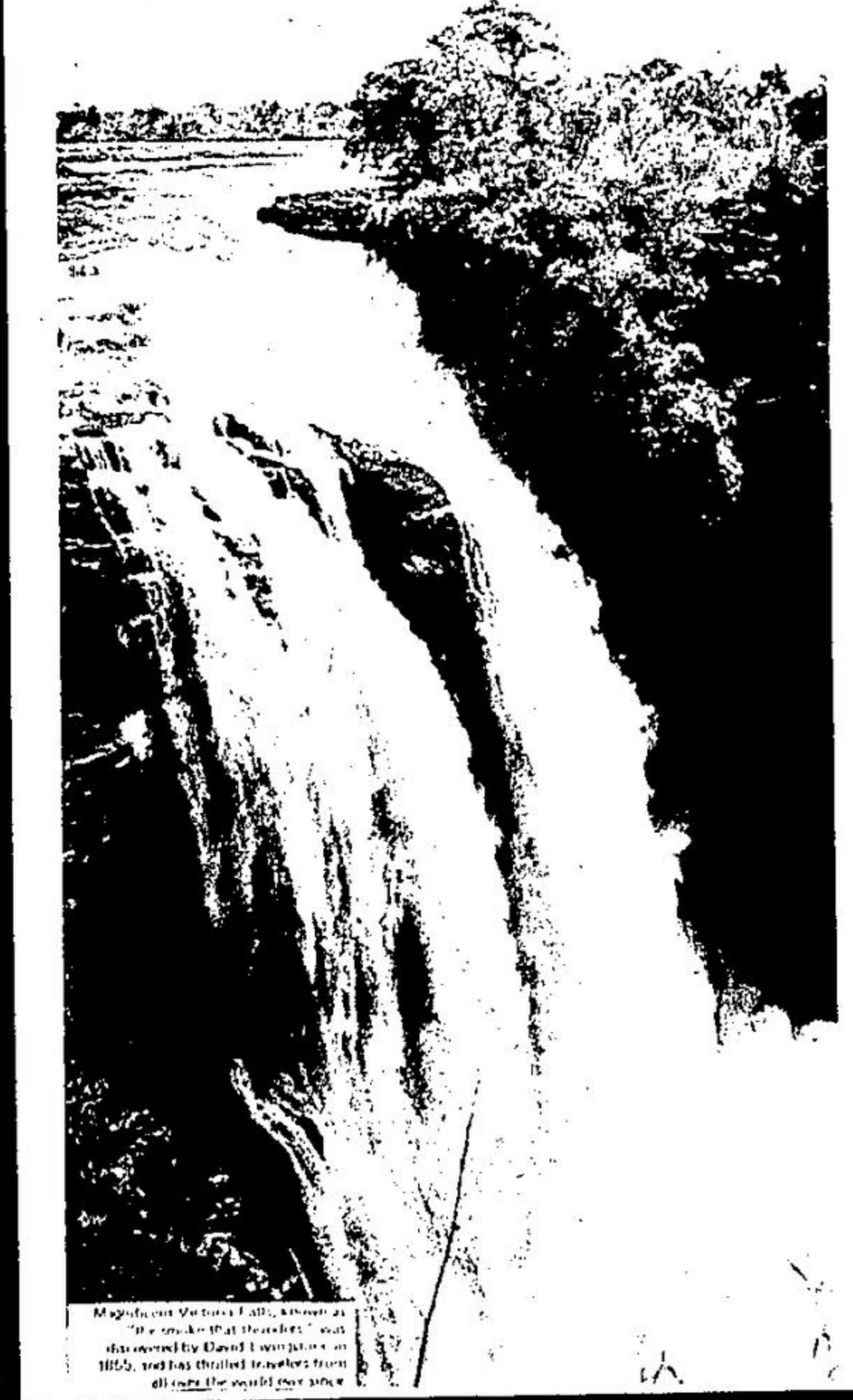
excursion to Luxor, the ancient Thebes. The monuments here are awesome. Thebes consisted of two cities - that of the living on the east bank of the Nile, and that of the dead on the west bank. All the remains of the original dwelling on the east bank are two grand temples dedicated to the gods, the Temple of Luxor and the Temple of Karnak. One of the major attractions on the west bank is the Valley of the Kings, where more than 40 pharaohs were buried in ornate subterranean palaces.

GHANA
 Accra: The capital of Ghana, Accra has a population of approximately 750,000 with a standard of living that ranges from shanty poverty and khaki rags to the big bougainvillea hungatows and stunning high fashion. Everyone who visits Accra should try to see the Makola Market where the market women control trade and hold court in a true matriarchal style. For the shoppers the Ghanaian markets offer some of West Africa's finest carvings, brass castings, weaving, hats, pottery, textiles and musical instruments.

IVORY COAST
 Abidjan: The Ivory Coast's capital city of Abidjan covers the shores and peninsulas of several bays, connected by

the Vridi Canal with the Gulf of Guinea three miles from the city's central Plateau. Abidjan's pride and joy is the luxurious Hotel D'Ivoire on the Bay of Cocody. The hotel offers everything from bowling alleys and an ice skating rink to an casino and a super market, as well as serving as an outlet for many West Africa's fine arts and crafts.

KENYA
 Nairobi: Nairobi is Kenya's capital, beginning as a railroad construction camp in 1895. The city is the center of Kenyan government, education and industry, and is one of the few cities in the world that can boast of wild animals roaming just 10 minutes from downtown in Nairobi National Park. African handicrafts and artifacts are abundant at reasonable prices. The Nairobi Hilton will be our base camp as we come and go on safaris (which is the Swahili word meaning "to travel") adventures to fascinating lodges in the African bush.



RUHODESIA
 Victoria Falls: "This was the most wonderful sight I had witnessed in Africa," wrote David Livingstone about the falls that he first saw in 1855 and named for Queen Victoria. Spectacular is indeed the word to describe Victoria Falls. We'll explore the falls on foot taking the footpath through the rain forest, the Chain Walk path and other trails. We'll spend the night at the colonial Victoria Falls Hotel and watch the "smoke" from the falls from its spacious verandah.

BOTSWANA
 Chobe National Park: Embedded in the Republic of South Africa is the independent republic of Botswana. Botswana covers an area of 220,000 square miles (slightly smaller than Texas) and extends from the Molopo River (a tributary of the Orange River) in the south, to the Chobe River which joins the Zambezi in the north. In the north of Botswana is Chobe National Park. The game reserve is one of the most modern, yet compared with the reserves of East Africa, it is largely unspoiled. Elephants abound and strange birds flock along the banks of the Chobe River.

ETHIOPIA
 Addis Ababa: The bustling capital city of Ethiopia is a mixture of churches, palaces, modern buildings and the one-and-two room mud and wattle dwellings that shelter a growing population. Ethiopia is a shopper's dream. Shopping is fun here where bargaining is the name of the game. The
